Marymede Clubs

This term, a wide range of lunchtime and afterschool clubs and activities are on offer for students looking to learn new skills or build on existing ones. Just some of the clubs currently running include:

Juggling Club – lunchtime on Mondays

For students in Years 5-12, the juggling club meet in SS010 to learn to juggle balls in a range of juggling patterns, improving eye-hand coordination, concentration and confidence.

National Reconciliation Week: Friday May 27 – Friday June 3

Theme: 'Our History, Our Story, Our Future'

National Reconciliation Week is an annual celebration and is a time for all Australians to reflect on our shared histories, and on the contributions and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. The week is framed by two key events in Australia's history that provide strong symbols of the aspirations for reconciliation.

May 27 marks the anniversary of Australia's most successful referendum and a defining event in our nation's history. The 1967 Referendum saw over 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Commonwealth the power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and recognise them in the national census.

June 3 is Mabo Day – On this day in 1992, the High Court of Australia delivered its landmark Mabo decision which overturned the notion of 'terra nullius' and legally recognised Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples' connection to their country, a connection that existed prior to colonisation and continues today. This recognition paved the way for the Native Title system.

Throughout the week students at Marymede will use the Theme 'Our History, Our Story, Our Future' to reflect on our nation's history.

Archbishop's Catholic Man Breakfast Series – April 21

Nine young men were chosen and invited to attend the Catholic Man Breakfast Series hosted by Archbishop Denis Hart on April 21. Students heard Shane Healey former leading radio executive tell his story 'Radio, Rex and Religion'. Shane Healey shared his fascinating path to the top of the highly competitive and cut-throat radio industry in Australia. He brought a dose of humility to his observations about leadership and culture and the way he explained how he has connected with high profile performers such as Brian Naylor, Neil Mitchell and Rex Hunt. Our young men were fascinated to hear that at the peak of his career in radio, he put that all aside to join the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne in January 2015 as Director of Media and Communications. This breakfast was a great opportunity for our young men to represent the College and was a unique opportunity for men to gather and be encouraged and inspired in their faith.

I share the following reflection by one of the young men who was in attendance at the breakfast with you:

Reflecting on the breakfast over the past few days, I've been able to garner personal thoughts and key messages from Shane Healy's speech. His speech was very engaging and it held our attention for its entire duration, which allowed for us to take in his stories and messages. From Shane's speech, I've been able to consider how religion can affect and be a part of a person's life even if their life doesn't revolve around faith, as he shared his experiences prior to working in his current role. More personally, Shane has demonstrated how someone can achieve their dream occupation no matter how accessible or common the job is, which has helped to inspire me to continue working towards my dream occupation. I've really valued this opportunity as it's something I hadn't experienced before, and has taught me valuable lessons about my faith and role as a Catholic man in society. Thank you for the opportunity to attend this breakfast.



Year 10 Issues in Running the Country Excursion to the Victorian Parliament and Courts

Throughout this semester, the key areas of study for Issues in Running the Country (IRC) were the Australian government and law. In order to consolidate the information which the class had acquired throughout the two terms, an excursion to the city was arranged. On May 10, the Yr. 10 IRC class, accompanied by Ms. Esposito and Mr. Ndanema, travelled to the city to view the three major courts of Victoria as well as the Victorian Parliament House. Commencing our journey from South Morang Station, we disembarked at Flagstaff Station. From there, it was a short stroll to the three courts, which were located around the intersection of Lonsdale St and William St. In the Victorian court hierarchy, the lowest court is the Magistrates' court, the next highest is the County court and the one at the pinnacle is the Supreme Court. It was quite astonishing to learn that all three courts were adjacent to each other. The architecture of the three distinct courts was also significant since the County and Magistrates' court reflected contemporary designs in comparison to the Supreme Court, which showed more of a resemblance to 19th century styles. Following our exploration of the courts, we once again got onto a train and travelled to Parliament station. From here, we walked past the Old Treasury building and finally arrived at the Parliament House. After entering the House, we were taken on a tour. Throughout the tour, we were mesmerised by the history of the Parliament House in Melbourne and how it came to be developed. We learned about the functions of various minsters and the symbols associated with the parliament. Overall, the excursion was magnificent and helped the students to solidify their knowledge of the Australian Government and law.

It was fun, but the most excitement we had was when we came to the tournament. In tournament we learnt about knights and how they would fight. We all had a turn to hit the instructor as he wore heavy metal armour. He protected himself with a shield as we tried to hit him, but failed when he would block with the shield. It was fun as we used swords and axes that were made of wood.


Artist In School Program 2016

Asphyxia is deaf and because of this, she instructed the class using Auslan sign language and her interpreter. Her visit was also supported by the sub-school, St. Mary's School for the Hearing Impaired, from which one student has chosen to do VCE Studio Arts. Asphyxia had an impact on all the students, using new techniques and materials. This impact is evident in the following report.

Coming into Year 12, I struggled with the reality of the year ahead and I worried what Year 12 would make of me. Will my creativity fail? Will I succeed, or will I supress all my stress into a 0% at the end of the year exams? Due to the stress of VCE that I put onto myself I was at a loss of what makes me who I am. When meeting Asphyxia, I didn't know what I was headed for, if she would impact me at all or leave me with more questions than when I started.

Well, my doubts were proven wrong. Thanks to Mr Montana, we met the most inspiring artist that was able to understand where we all were emotionally. She was the hero of the classroom, she inspired us all creatively and spirituality. Did you know you have to take the caps of bottles before recycling? We found out how worms help with composting and why that is good for the plants in our gardens. On our farm tour, we had an opportunity to visit the farm animals which included a calf, a donkey, hens, a turkey, sheep, goats and even ducks. We also tried to identify some plants that grow on the farm.

We then got to design our own special bags using natural materials. We got some flowers and leaves of different plants and learnt how to use them to make prints by hammering them onto the fabric. Some of us gave the bags we made to our mums on Mother's Day.

Finally, we planted bean seeds and took them with us. We can't wait to watch them grow over time and learn more about their life cycle and what is needed to help them grow.

We had a fantastic time at Edendale Farm and learnt a lot. We look forward to returning there again.

Brendan Tresckitta's Fight Against Epilepsy-Go Fund Me

Brendan Tresckitta is a part of the Marymede community. He suffers from a severe form of epilepsy, which has seen his physical condition deteriorate rapidly over the last 7 months.

Brendan is your typical teenage boy who enjoys hanging out with his mates and playing PlayStation. He likes attending school, however, the medications he takes can have side effects which see him missing school for days and being house bound. Unfortunately Brendan is no longer able to do many everyday activities, and can become extremely fatigued. Brendan is also anaphylactic and has a hearing loss.

Brendan's form of epilepsy is rare, his body constantly shakes similar to a mild case of Parkinsons disease. Within a 10 minute period, Brendan can have up to 40 mini seizures, some which have been extremely severe. Unfortunately, thus far, medical treatment in Australia has not improved his condition. For this reason, Brendan and his family are seeking medical treatment in America. Medical treatment overseas is very expensive,
