Dear Parents, Staff, Students and Friends of our Marymede Community,

# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

#### **NAPLAN**

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 will sit the NAPLAN tests on May 10-12. The NAPLAN results offer a a valuable resource both to the school and families; they have the potential to shed interesting light on students' learning at a given point in time, and offer valuable information about what needs to be done next to improve literacy and numeracy achievement. However, NAPLAN is just one source of data teachers will use to measure student achievement and it is essential that these tests do not become a source of anxiety for students.

As a school, Marymede does not aim to prepare students for NAPLAN specifically. We aim to provide students with a targeted and rigorous literacy and numeracy program that reflects the Victorian Curriculum priorities. For younger students, we spend a small amount of time familiarizing them with the format and experience of the tests to ensure that the experience is not overwhelming or difficult. This also ensures that the unfamiliar format of the tests does not prevent them demonstrating what they can do and result in in accurate data.

If you have any concerns about the upcoming NAPLAN tests, please contact your child's pastoral teacher or myself.

#### **Examinations**

Examinations are stressful, there's no getting around it. The "Holmes and Rahe Scale", which ranks the experiences that cause people stress, indicates that 'sitting an important examination' sits just below 'serious family illness' and just above 'moving to a different city'.

From June 6 to 9, our Year 9 - 12 students will undertake their Semester One examinations and, while stressful, starting to study well in advance will assist in feeling confident and prepared to perform at their best. Student in Years 9-12 this week received their examination timetable and key information about semester examinations to assist them in starting to study and prepare for these upcoming assessments.

Currently, for in the final year of VCE, the October-November examinations make up 50% of a students' final score in a subject and exerts some influence over their marks in school-assessed assessments, too. Becoming successful at sitting examinations is a skill and, like any skill, one that is developed and refined over time. As a result, it is very important for students to hone their examination skills in Years 9-11, to

ensure that they reach Year 12 with strong study skills and a successful approach to exams.

## **General Achievement Test (GAT)**

All students completing a Unit 3 & 4 Subject - whether they are in Year 12 or a Year 11 completing an accelerated study – must sit the 3-hour VCAA General Achievement Test (GAT) on June 7 from 10am-1pm.

The GAT is a test of general knowledge and skills in written communication, mathematics, science and technology, and humanities, the arts and social sciences. While there is no specific study or preparation that students can do to prepare for the GAT, it is recommended that students familiarize themselves with the format and types of questions on the GAT to ensure they know what to expect. While the GAT does not directly contribute to Year 12's final ATAR, it is a very important assessment for a number of the following reasons.

- It is an 'insurance policy' for students who experience significant illness during the final examinations and are unable to sit an examination.
   VCAA will use the student's GAT score to calculate a 'derived score' for their studies.
- It is used in the moderation of students' school-based assessment results; in other words, it influences whether the marks students receive throughout the year are raised or lowered in ensuring equity between schools.
- It is used to check the accuracy of examination results and in the ranking of students with similar results in a study.

In a nutshell, the higher your GAT score, the more likely it is that the GAT will help you; so students are encouraged to approach the task determined to do their best.

### **Learning and Teaching Initiatives**

With all this talk about tests and examinations, this week's highlighted initiative outlines the strengthening of the subject selection processes for current Year 10 & 11 students, which will see Semester 1 examination scores play a more significant role in influencing subject choices for 2017.

Initiative 5: Given that examinations in Year 12 exert an enormous influence over students' final results, the need for students to approach the Year 10 & 11 examinations as an opportunity to hone their study and response skills is essential. In approving subjects for students in VCE, the school takes very seriously the need for students to enrol in studies in which they have the greatest opportunity for success and have demonstrated the foundational knowledge required to manage the demands of a VCE study.

As such, as students in Year 10 & 11 commence their subject selection next term, they will only be guaranteed approval in their selected studies in 2017 if they have achieved a minimum

of 60% in the examination of the related study or studies in Semester 1 2016. Students should also be aware that they must achieve a minimum of 50% in both their English and Religious Education examinations in order to be approved to commence or continue in VCE.

Students who struggle to achieve a satisfactory result will have the opportunity to resit examinations after school on Tuesday June 21 – Thursday June 23 and, while the original mark will appear on semester reports, the resit mark will be considered in the subject selection process.

It is our hope that these measures both ensure students are motivated to strive to achieve to their best in the Year 10 & 11 examinations and that they commence a program of study in VCE in 2017 in which they can feel confident and are positioned to succeed.




# The Wedding Singer Tickets Selling Fast

## Information Communication Technology Update

#### Warranty, Damages of Devices

While students are natural users of technology, they also have to be responsible citizens and members of the school community. As such, students are primarily responsible for the care, security, proper use and proper functioning of their computer. We would also ask that parents play a role in monitoring these aspects of the Computer Program. Students are expected to use their computer during 2016 in all of their classes. This will be further supported by ebooks for all core subjects in 2016 in Years 7-10. The computer is the property of Marymede Catholic College. At the end of 2016 Year 9 and Year 12 students will need to return their computers to the College. These devices will be returned to the Lease Company. They must be in good working order and physical condition.

Please refer to the attached document on the side bar about process and costs to be incurred for damages to devices. If the Notebook is lost, stolen or damaged, you must report this to the IT Helpdesk immediately. An **Incident Report Form** is to be completed and submitted to the Helpdesk.

#### **Accidental Damage and Non Accidental Damage**

There are two types of damage as defined by the College: Accidental Damage (which covers matters of general wear and tear) and Non-Accidental Damage (as outlined in attached document).

Accidental Damage is covered by a \$100 excess for each claim and Non-Accidental Damage is covered by a \$300 excess.

#### Theft or Loss of Charger and or Stylus

- Damage, theft or loss of AC adaptor
- · Damage, theft or loss of stylus

In these circumstances the full costs of repairs will be charged to families. These costs are less than \$100. Chargers must be purchased via the College as they have to be original Toshiba chargers (no third party chargers are accepted) in order to ensure that warranty is not void.
