DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

Years 11 & 12 2018

Students in Years 10 & 11 will sit their Semester 2 examinations from November 16-21 and begin their Year 11 and 12 Commencement Program on Thursday 23 November. They will not be required to attend school on November 22. The VCE Commencement Program will include one full two-week cycle of classes in which teachers will begin introducing the first units of work; as such, it is essential for all students to attend the full program. Students moving into Year 11 or Year 12 VCAL

will receive information from the VCAL Coordinator about their Commencement Program.

Transitions

The Year 6 Camp will not only be a fantastic learning experience for the students but will also be the first stage of their transition into the Secondary School. Students have been grouped in House-based groups for their week-long camp in order to assist them in making connections with the students that will be in their Year 7 class groups next year.

When the students return from camp, they will have a further two days in November – November 20 and 27, when they will spend the day undertaking their classes in these House based groups, with the Year 6 teachers and the Secondary School House Coordinators, working with them to ensure that they are comfortable and working productively in these groups in preparation for next year.

On December 12, the Year 6's will have their formal Transition Day in the Secondary School when they will be joined by the students from other Primary Schools coming to Marymede in 2018.

Meanwhile, our 2018 Preps will be back at school this afternoon for the Twilight Orientation. While they are enjoying another fun session in the Prep House, new Prep parents are invited to attend an information session in the Auditorium from 4-5pm. We look forward to seeing all our new students and new families again this afternoon.

Year 7 Enhanced Learning Program 2018

Letters of offer will be sent off to around 26 students enrolled in Year 7 in 2018 in the next fortnight inviting them to participate in our Enhanced Learning Program group. Next year, students selected for the Enhanced Learning Program will have the opportunity to be extended and, in some cases, accelerated, in all of their subjects. A little over two-thirds of the students invited into the program in 2018 are currently enrolled in Year 6 at Marymede, while the remainder are new enrolments in the College.

Students have been selected based on Literacy and Numeracy Testing Data as well as teacher feedback and their engagement in the curriculum in Year 6. The quality of students who have been considered for the program is very strong and there are many more able and hardworking students than there are places in the Enhanced Learning Class. For those students who are not selected for the program in 2018, we will ensure they still have the opportunity to be challenged within their mainstream class next year.

We recently advertised a small number of spaces that will be available in our Year 9 Enhanced Learning Class in 2018 and we have been overwhelmed by the interest in these places. Students who have registered interest in these spaces will complete literacy and numeracy tests this week and we will seek teacher feedback. We will aim to notify families of the outcome within the next fortnight.

New Awards at Secondary School Awards Night

At the Secondary School Awards Night this year, we will be introducing some new awards. In addition to the Subject Prizes

allocated to the student who achieves the highest marks on assessment tasks in each subject, this year we have introduced three Domain Leader Awards per year level: the *Domain Leader Award for Creativity, Domain Leader Award for Resilience, and Domain Leader Award for Critical Thinking & Problem Solving.*

Increasingly, creativity, critical thinking & problem solving, and resilience are qualities in high demand in industry and tertiary education. In the 21st Century where all knowledge is a Google search away, the capacity to innovate and find solutions has become an incredibly valuable and important capacity. In recognition of the value of these skills, these new awards seek to encourage students to foster these capabilities. The award recipients will be determined by the panel of Domain Leaders based on nominations from the classroom teachers.

A brief description of each of these awards is given below:

The Domain Leader Award for Critical Thinking & Problem Solving

The student demonstrates some or all of these qualities:

- In problem solving situations, the student shows lateral thinking, asks deep or inquisitive questions and may show a willingness to think of various solutions.
- In discussion, the student shows insight into topics which are atypical of their peers' general insights.
- Original, innovative or ingenious thinking is demonstrated in discussion, formative work or assessment tasks.
- In individual or collaborative work, the student thinks critically (evaluates and/or analyses) and articulates these thoughts about how the group needs to function to achieve the best outcomes/solve a problem or respond to a question.
- In collaborative work, the student thinks critically (evaluates and/or analyses) about the problem posed and articulates questions or ideas that demonstrate a capacity to see possibilities, see possible obstacles and anticipate implications.

The Domain Leader Award for Resilience

The student demonstrates some or all of these qualities:

- He or she shows determination to improve and continually grow
- He or she demonstrates optimism or courage in the face of challenge.
- The student is prepared to ask questions or proactively seek help from teachers or peers to support their growth.
- The student consistently strives to do his or her best in his or her studies.
- The student makes use of feedback to enhance his or her learning or work
- The student models persistence, determination, self-reflection, motivation and self-direction.

The Domain Leader Award for Creativity

The student demonstrates some or all of these qualities:

- The student frequently demonstrates a grasp of a variety of concepts or significant ideas and of divergent thinking in his or her work.
- The student uses his or her imagination in highly original ways.
- The student thinks of and /or actions innovative ways to address a question or complete a project.
- The student has strong creative skills in one or more particular field – the Arts, Music, Media, Maths, Humanities, Science - and uses that skill in completion of his or her work in other subject areas.
- The student frequently shows different, 'outside the box' thinking or action when attempting work or engaged in group or class discussion.

Vietnam Veteran Guest Speaker

As we approach Remembrance Day, we invited guest speaker Ray Weston from the Vietnam Veterans' Education Unit to speak to our students in Year 11 History about the Vietnam War and to share his experiences as a soldier. Ray was a passionate presenter and expert in the intricacies of the war fought in Vietnam. The Cold War has been a central focus of our studies in Year 11. Here are some of the students' reflections on what they heard and on what they found to be valuable.

"The session that we had with Ray I found incredibly helpful and interesting as it gave me new insights into the Vietnam War and the lives of the soldiers during and afterward. One of the most fascinating things I found was the media's involvement and the way the war was broadcast to the Australian public and how that changed people's opinions on war. 

On Wednesday, each group was given a timetable and got to experience a typical day at Marymede Catholic College. In each group there were four to five students, two teachers one who was Indigenous and could help the teacher/s communicate in Murrinhpatha (native language) and a year ten REMAR student. The students could speak English although it was very limited and as they were extremely shy it took a while for them to open up and feel comfortable with talking to the Year 10's and other Marymede students.

During the day the students got to experience the classroom environment through different classes like Maths, English, Humanities, Art, Music, Religion and practical subjects like Food Technology and Wood Technology. In most of these classes they played games that related back to the subject so that it would be an enjoyable experience, you could see the joy in their eyes when you told them we were going to their favourite classes next.

This was an amazing experience for all of us involved, we got to learn so much through this experience, make new friends and we can't wait to go back and learn more about their way of life like they learnt about ours.

Exam Time

Our Year 12 students are doing exams, Year 10 and 11 are about to get under way and Year 9 will follow. A lot of students get anxious about exams. My advice for parents is get involved. Come up with a study schedule with your child and hold them to it. It is easier to hold them to account if its's locked into a timetable. As a parent of a child doing their final VCE exams this year I find it works to have a yearly planner on the wall in front of his/her study desk. Everything can be recorded on it. This includes social activities, exams and study times.

Students, try to keep a normal routine. Make sure you take care of your physical and mental health. Remember it is only a short period of time, it's not a big part of your life. Make sure you take time out for yourself during exam study. Just try your very best because it's the best you can do, and everything will be fine. Don't plan to do last minute cramming the night before your exam. Get a good night's sleep instead. Take it easy, don't stress yourself and don't stay up all night.

If you find yourself crippled by a mind blank in the middle of an exam, just take time to calm down. Melbourne University educational neuroscientist Dr Jared Cooney Horvath says that the brain interprets the situation as a threat, even for a split second, and in that moment it wipes your working memory clear. He says if you have a mind blank, remember it's just your threat response, it doesn't mean you forgot everything. He recommends, just put the pen down, close your eyes and take a deep breath and let go. It is the most important 60 seconds you've got. It may be the one thing you don't want to do, but it's the one thing that will bring you back on line.

I believe in each and every one of you and know you can do it. Good luck in your exams.


Work Experience

All VET students are strongly advised to do a minim of 5 days placement in the school holidays working in the industry related to their VET subject.

Outstanding Fees

At this stage of the year all family fee accounts are required to be paid as per the payment terms (February to October each year) as stipulated in the College Fee Policy.

If you have an agreed payment arrangement with the College or have discussed your circumstances with the College Business Manager, payment is required as agreed.

Over the coming weeks the College will be contacting families with regards to their outstanding accounts, unless account is paid, or an arrangement put in place.

Should you require assistance with meeting your financial commitment to the college, please contact the College to arrange an appointment with Business Manager to discuss payment of fees.

Carparking – Drop-off & Pickup Areas

We are very concerned at the increasingly dangerous driving practices around the School at drop off and pick up times.

We know the start and end of the school day can be hectic for parents and finding parking can be a challenge but it has become apparent that the community is no longer prepared to tolerate unsafe and illegal traffic behaviour. We have implemented various measures to try and reduce congestion in local streets and at the same time ensure the safety of our students. We are working with the Whittlesea City Council with regards to increase supervision in this area.

The College is constantly informed by Parents that Drivers are:

- Double Parking on Williamsons Road
- Blocking Pedestrian crossings
- Speeding in Drop off/Pickup zone
- Parking in the Drop off/Pickup zone
- Entering from Exit Only gates
- Blocking Entry Gates

This was particularly dangerous for Cars trying to park at the College and pedestrians and students who were trying to cross the road to reach the School.

We share the concern of our community and urge you to consider your child's safety and the safety of others when you are dropping off and picking up from the school. Please also bear in mind that as a parent of Marymede Catholic College you represent the school; we do not want our good name tarnished by the thoughtlessness of some members of our community.

We thank you for your cooperation and support in this important matter.

Speed Limit on School grounds

For the Safety of all Students, staff and Visitors to our school, cars entering school grounds should always observe speeds signs and Travel only at 10km per hour.

Student Supervision Before and After School

The safety and wellbeing of our students at Marymede is very important to us. We are very fortunate at Marymede Catholic College to have an on-site provider of Before and After School Care provided by Camp Australia.

This service provided by and administered enables parents/ guardians to access care for their primary school aged child/ ren in the mornings and afternoons outside of the times that teachers are on supervision duty in the College grounds.

Before School Care provided by Camp Australia runs from 6:30am - 8:45am, Monday to Friday and After School Care runs from 3:15pm - 6:00pm, Monday to Friday. Before and after these times, there is no supervision provided by the College on the College grounds.

The teachers commence their yard duty supervision in the playground at 8:20am and it concludes at 3:40pm. Unless a student is attending Before School Care and/or After School Care, no students should be on the College campus before 8:20am or after 3:40pm.

Any primary student who is on the College campus before 8:20am will be taken to Before School care where they will be supervised until 8:45am. Camp Australia will charge parents for supervision of their child/ren.

The same applies to any students who are not collected from the College campus by 3:40pm. They will be taken to After School care, where they will be supervised until they are collected by a parent/guardian. Camp Australia will charge parents for supervision.

Primary students are unable to use the College Library as a before or after hours supervision area, unless they are supervised by a Parent or Guardian. Primary students with Secondary school siblings are unable to be supervised by their Secondary school sibling in the library and would also need to abide by the above.

Marymede Station construction works

The Mernda Rail Extension Project is constructing a new train station opposite Marymede Catholic College.

As part of this, the project team is currently undertaking works involving excavation, rock breaking and site foundation preparations using stockpiled materials.

Please be aware these activities may cause additional dust in the area, particularly during the warmer months, and we are continuing to monitor and manage the impacts on the local community.

While we are working, we will take the following steps to minim


- dust monitoring systems will be set up on site to regularly test conditions
 diditional water carts will be on site to assist with dust suppression
 stockpiles along Williamsons Road will be regularly sprayed with water to seal fine dust
 sweepers and water carts will be used to regularly clean surrounding roads
 worksite speed limits will be reduced to 30km p/h during windy conditions
 dust suppression will be prioritised during peak school drop-off/ pick-up times
 handling of stockpiled material will be minimised as much as possible

The project team will continue to maintain regular contact with Marymede Catholic College staff to ensure any issues or concerns are addressed appropriately.
