Grooming and Personal Presentation

It is my expectation that our students will present themselves well at all times and wear the College uniform with pride and in an acceptable manner. I ask for parental support to ensure that the high grooming standard of our College is maintained.

I would like to mention specifically:

Jewellery:

Apart from watches and a chain with a small crucifix, no other jewellery is to be worn at school. This includes bracelets, rings etc.

Body Piercings:

Students may wear one plain earring per ear in the ear lobe (no spacers of dermals). No other objects are permitted in the eye brow, nose, lip etc.

Hair:

Extreme hair styles are not permitted. These include dreadlocks, Mohican style cuts, extreme long or short styles (Level 3 is the minimum hair length). Hair is to be of one natural colouring.

Facial Hair:

Boys are expected to be clean shaven at all times.

Summer Uniforms Only:

I remind both parents and students that the following items have been introduced to the summer uniforms:

Boys – Short, blue with stripes **Girls** – Short blue, plain

Girls Dresses:

Some of our female students may have grown over the holidays. I ask that you check the length of your dress before returning to school to ensure that it touches the knee.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

New in 2018

After a successful year of innovation last year – that included the introduction of the fantastically successful Year 5 & 6 Rotations, the launch of the Year 7 and Year 8 Enhanced Learning Streams, the implementation of the Perceptual Motor Program (PMP) in junior primary, and the establishment of Year Level Specialists in Year 3 & 4 – we are looking forward to launching

a number of exciting new initiatives in 2018 that will further enhance the opportunities available to our students.

Over the next few newsletters, I look forward to profiling these new programs with you including Year 9 Project Based Learning, the expansion of the Enhanced Learning Program at Year 7 & 9, the inclusion of Design and Media in our Grade 3 & 4 Specialisations, and the introduction of the Year 10 Mentoring program.

We are also delighted to have Deb Molloy stepping into the newly created role of Primary Learning and Teaching Coordinator. Deb will be working closely with our primary teams to continue to enhance their planning of outstanding learning experiences for our students in P-6.

VCE Results

For much of the Class of 2017, their parents and their teachers, the release of the VCE results was a well-earned reward for a year of hard work. Our students received some outstanding results, with our median study score rising even further above the state median this year and the College recording its highest ever average ATAR – 65.31.

Special congratulations are extended to our ATAR Dux Steven Azzopardi along with our Study Score Dux Jordyn Cullen. We look forward to having Steven and Jordyn attend our upcoming assembly on February 5 and share their insights into their VCE experience with our secondary students. We will also celebrate the achievements of the many students who achieved study scores of 40 or above in their studies (placing them in the top 9% of students enrolled in the subject across the state) including; Amy Bowlen, Chirag Charan Singh; Jacinta Constanza; Jordyn Cullen, Duncan Do, Chelsea Hardie; Ajay Jay; Olivia Mack; Angelique Milevski; Alec Prestia-Cook; Chloe Radovic; Jacob Talevski; Emilly Turner; Kaitlyn Van Amelsvoort and Lucas Vasilevski.

In addition to these achievements, we also had 7 students amongst our Year 12's eligible for the award of the VCE (Baccalaureate). To be awarded the VCE (Baccalaureate), students must complete their VCE with an English score of 30 or above as well as taking on the challenge of both a higher-level mathematics subject – ie. Mathematical Methods or Specialist Mathematics – and a VCE language study. In other words, a demanding program of study. Congratulations to our successful recipients: Steven Azzopardi, Hayden Cox, Jordyn Cullen, Madison Delios, Duncan Do, Nimrat Kullar and Deepti Singh.

In January, the strong VCE performance translated into the overwhelming majority of VCE students receiving first round tertiary offers. 92% of students who applied tertiary courses received a first-round offer, with 60% of these students being offered a place in their 'first preference' course.

Having met with both the Year 12's and Year 11's on their first day back at the College, it was great to have the opportunity to remind them of the importance to utilise their time at school and at home effectively in order to achieve their goals. At Year 12, students should be spending a minimum of 3 hours a night (or 15 hours per week) on homework and study in order to ensure they are preparing themselves effectively throughout the year. If you have concerns about the level of homework your son or

daughter is completing in Year 12 - or at any other year level - you are encouraged to contact their Tutor Teacher, House Coordinator, Subject Teachers, VCE Coordinator or myself to discuss your concerns.

Supporting students' learning

The new year offers a fantastic opportunity to re-establish good routines and reading and study habits to benefit your child's learning. The impact of the home environment on a child's learning cannot be overstated and its influence over student achievement shouldn't be overlooked. Creating a home environment that fosters and values learning is essential and some of the key things to establish for the start of 2018 include:

- Having a dedicated space for your child to complete homework or study (ideally, this should not be a bedroom or an isolated space but somewhere where you can observe and commend their efforts)
- Considering the family schedule to ensure there is time for learning tasks and regular reading amongst work, sporting and other commitments
- Reducing the amount of screen time for your child (and potentially for the whole family) and increasing the opportunities for reading, interaction and physical activity
- Reading to and talking with your child about school, books, topics they are learning to demonstrate your interest in their learning
- Working with them to plan out their study/homework time and set achievable goals and targets that assist them to learn to work productively

This term we will have important information evenings to assist with key information parents will need to support their sons or daughters at key stages in their educational journey. We strongly encourage parents to attend the relevant information evenings in order to be armed and ready for the challenges ahead.

During our trip, there were opportunities for us to engage with people at the local markets when buying our daily food, in the city on a historical tour, and through art therapy, reflections and processing. We were able to participate in a children's feeding ministry, release baby pawikan (sea turtles), and go on unexpected boat rides during our rural and urban experiences.

In addition to this, going to a peace rally and meeting many influential and inspirational people helped us share an insight into the daily lives of many Filipino people. Amazing new friends and leaders allowed some of our students to thrive beyond their wildest dreams.

Thank you to all the staff on the ground in the Philippines for making this immersion trip a life-changing experience.

It is with great excitement that I welcome all students and families back to the 2018 school year! I especially welcome our new students and their families to our school and wish you well as you begin your journey with us.

This year promises to be full of rich, diverse and engaging opportunities for students to grow in their learning as well as in their emotional, physical, social and spiritual development. We look forward to working with you in the very important partnership between home and school that facilitates this growth in our students.

2018 Staffing

I am pleased to welcome back our dedicated and hard-working staff from their well-earned break and hope that they have been able to re-energise their batteries and spend precious time with their families and friends, ready for another great year. I would also like to extend a warm welcome to a number of new staff to the primary school this year.

I know that you will join with me in wishing all our staff a happy, productive and rewarding year as they embark on the very important and inspiring work that they do with our students.

Communication With Teachers

All staff value and welcome the opportunity to discuss matters relating to your sons or daughters. Generally, appointments are recommended to ensure that teachers are available to meet with you. The most effective way to contact staff is via their school email, by phone or you are welcome to leave a message with Mrs.Easdon at the Primary Office.

Please note the following key points about 'catching up' with teachers before and after school:

- Staff attend Prayer/Briefing most mornings and are generally unavailable from 8.20 am.
- Staff are not available once the bell goes in the morning as they are actively supervising and preparing students for the day.
- Some staff may be engaged in before or after school yard duty.
- Staff are required to attend before and after school meetings.

Communication With Students

As communicated in previous newsletters, we are unable to pass on email or phone messages from parents to students relating to after school pick up arrangements, as Mrs Easdon is unable to leave the Primary reception unattended to relay these messages and teachers may not receive emails or phone calls in time to pass them onto students before they leave for the day. Please make clear the after school pick up arrangements in the morning before drop off. Exceptions can only be made in the event of unforeseen circumstances. In the event of an emergency or something urgent, speak to Ms. Easdon in the office and she will assist you.

Pre-Testing

The pre-testing days in week 1 offered teachers the opportunity to work with a number of students in order to ascertain their prior learning, interests, strengths and to determine starting points for teaching. For those students who were not able to be seen on the testing days or whose testing is not quite finished, teachers will have opportunities to continue this testing in the coming weeks.

Student Planners

Student planners have been given out to all students from Prep - Year12.

Please take the opportunity to read the introductory pages related to behaviour and learning expectations, uniform guidelines, school policy information and other important matters with your children, particularly students in year 4-6. For younger children, this may be a discussion of the most important things such as behaviour expectations and uniform guidelines. You will note that there is a requirement for students in Years 4-6 and their parent/s to sign the agreement. For students in years Prep- 3, teachers will advise parents of the process and agreement to be used.

From Prep to Year 3, the planner acts as a home reading record as well as giving parents and teachers the opportunity to write brief notes and reminders to each other.

From Year 4 to Year 6, the planner is to be used <u>by students</u> to record their own home reading as well as record their homework, reminders, meetings with teachers, sport training, times for co-curricular activities, tasks to be completed, things to bring from home, etc. This assists students at these levels to develop important time management and organisational skills. It can also give parents and teachers the opportunity to write brief notes and reminders to each other.

At all levels, planners should be regularly checked and signed by parents. Year level teachers will advise their classes how often they would like this done.

Planners are also a good reference for some of the policies and procedures of the school you may need to refer to during the year.

Any student will need at tax file number if he/she <u>starts work</u> (part-time and full-time) and all students planning on a tertiary education require one when they start.



Tuckwell Scholarship

So, Tuckwell Scholar students will receive:

\$21,700 per annum (2016 rate) (increasing with inflation) for each year of their degree, for up to five years, to cover on-campus residential costs, books and general living expenses

- priority access guaranteed to ANU-approved student accommodation
- an annual allowance of up to \$2,000 to assist with their move to Canberra and to support two annual return journeys (e.g. airfares) between their home and the University for each year of their degree. The allowance will be dependent on the proximity of their family home to ANU.
- a domestic economy return airfare, or other transport costs, for their parents to visit at the start of the program, and
- an ANU Sports Centre membership for the length of their degree.

Scholarships are awarded based on four criteria:

academic potential and achievements to date;

- other significant achievements to date, of any type;
- demonstration of the Attributes of a Tuckwell Scholar; and
- a desire to eventually give back to Australia.

Administration of Medication

From the beginning of 2018, Marymede Catholic College will be updating our procedures for 'Medication Administration' to ensure the best possible care for our students P-12. Where possible it will be requested for students to self-administer in front of the College Nurse and in the instance

where assistance is required two staff members (including the Nurse) will be required to administer the medication.
