DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

NAPLAN

This term, students in Years 3, 5, 7 & 9 will sit their NAPLAN tests on May 15, 16 & 17. Over these three days, students will sit tests to assess their reading, writing, numeracy and language conventions (ie. spelling, punctuation & grammar):

NAPLAN results are very useful in so far as they provide another source of data to assess students' progress in literacy and numeracy. For the College, NAPLAN data is one of a number of important tools we use to assess programs and critically evaluate our current approaches to literacy and numeracy across P-10.

However, it is essential to remember that NAPLAN is just one set of tests in one week and the results for an individual student should never be considered in isolation. A student's state of health, recent sleeping patterns, personal circumstances, environmental factors, anxiety and any number of other factors can impact on their performance in a particular test. Additionally, NAPLAN assesses a relatively narrow range of skills and abilities; while the broader picture of student achievement is much broader and richer than NAPLAN is able to reflect. As such, teachers always draw on a variety of data to assess student achievement.

While there are some schools actively coach students for NAPLAN, our primary and secondary staff are encouraged not to let the NAPLAN change or dictate the students' classroom learning. We seek to provide students with personalised and challenging literacy and numeracy programs in line with the Victorian Curriculum and to give students rich and meaningful learning experiences. We will spend a small amount of time familiarizing students in Year 3, 5 and 7 with the format of the tests to ensure that the experience is not overwhelming and that they are able familiar with the types of questions they will encounter so that they feel confident to tackle the tasks.

Students sitting NAPLAN are encouraged to approach the task with the intention to work to the best of their abilities – as we would encourage them to approach everything at school and beyond – but avoid becoming too concerned or anxious about the tests or the results. NAPLAN is just one of many activities, assessments and experiences they will have over the course of the year that gives them and the school a chance to observe the progress they are making.

If you have any concerns about the upcoming NAPLAN tests, please contact your child's pastoral teacher or myself.

Examinations

For our Year 9-12 students, Term 2 is the study and examination term. **From June 12 to 15**, our **Year 9 - 11 students** will undertake their Semester 1 examinations.

In the final year of VCE, the October-November examinations make up 50% of a students' final score in a subject and has some influence over their marks in school-assessed assessments, too. Becoming successful at examinations is a skill that is developed and mastered over time. As a result, it is essential for students to practice their examination and study skills in Years 9-11, to ensure that by the time they reach Year 12 they have developed excellent study skills and a proficient approach to exam.

To ensure that students are well placed by Year 12, students' results in their Year 10 & 11 mid-year examinations are a key factor in approving their subject choices for next year. Students begin subject selection for 2019 in Term 3 and will only be guaranteed approval in their selected studies for Year 10 & 11 if they have achieved a minimum of 60% in the examination of the related study or studies in Semester 1 2018. Students should also be aware that they must achieve a minimum of 50% in both their English and Religious Education examinations in order to be approved to commence or continue in VCE.

Students who struggle to achieve a satisfactory result will have the opportunity to resit examinations on school on Monday July 2 (the first Monday of the Term 2 holidays) and, while the original mark will appear on semester reports, the resit mark will be considered in the subject selection process.

For **Year 12 students and Year 11 students completing accelerated studies**, their first set of trial examinations will take place from **July 2-4**. These exams have been scheduled during the first week of the term break in order to ensure the best opportunity for students to test their knowledge of the Unit 3 content without missing out on valuable class time. These trial examinations are compulsory for all students completing scored assessment.

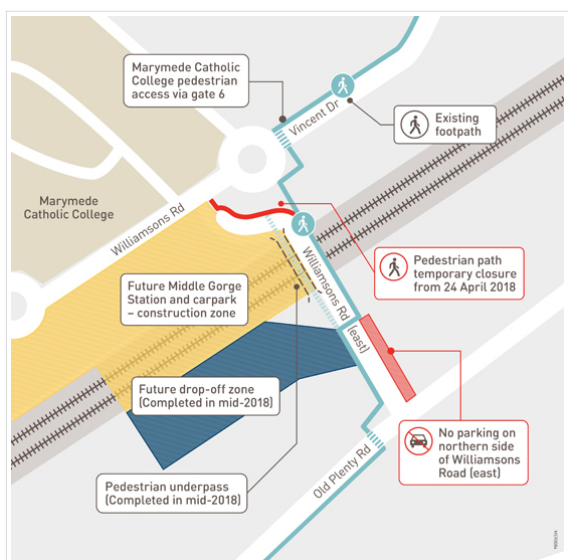

Mernda Rail Update

Old Plenty Road access and turning circle has been altered in preparation for the final ‘Kiss and Drop’ area at Middle Gorge Station. For safety reasons, there will be increased barriers throughout this area and as such, students should only be dropped off/picked up where there are gaps between these safety barriers. Please be cautious of loose gravel and stones underfoot.

From Tuesday April 24, pedestrian access at the Williamsons Rd end will be altered and students will cross Williamsons Rd at a temporary crossing North of the Gate E round-about. Students will cross from the bus stop on the East side of Williamsons Rd and enter the College through the pedestrian gate at the Fitness Centre – they will not be permitted to cross Gate E vehicle access. The new pedestrian underpass and drop-off zone will be completed in mid-2018.

Traffic Safety

With works on the carparking area adjacent to the Early Learning Centre and Trade Skills Centre we would like to remind all families of a temporary change in car parking spaces surrounding the College.

- As of Tuesday April 17 – Gate A will be closed at all times with no vehicle access available as a result of works on Marymede Early Learning Centre;

- Families wishing to use the Primary Drop-Off/Pick-Up spaces will be required to enter via Gate B and exit via Gate C (as per normal);
- Gate E will remain open as per normal;
- Where spaces are available, families may also use the new temporary car park space along Williamsons Road opposite the Gate B parking area (shown in the attached photo). Please ensure you cross the road safely and adhere to any directions given to you by staff present. Please refer to the attached photo.

We thank you for your support and co-operation during this construction phase and would like to remind all families of the importance in driving with caution and being respectful of fellow parents/students during morning and afternoon drop-off/pick-up times.

To reduce congestion:

1. Park and walk – park your vehicle further away from the College and walk with your children. Be prepared with umbrellas in your vehicle in case of wet weather.
2. Drive through the drop-off /pick-up zone to the end, following the directions of staff. This enables traffic to flow from Williamsons Road more readily. Be prompt with disembarkation.

Knit-A-Square Is Back For 2018

The Square Knit Circle is extremely excited to be regrouping for 2018 to carry on the tremendous work we have been conducting since 2011.

In November last year, our 900+ knitted squares were packed into water-tight shipping envelopes, sent to Kascare's branch in South Africa and stitched into lovely blankets. The Marymede community contributed enough squares to warm children in the South Africa who would otherwise have been freezing. We feel extremely proud that our small contribution will become wonderful blankets, used to keep orphaned, abandoned or children with AIDS, warm.

Where to from here?

Knitting club is every Wednesday lunch time, we hope to regroup bigger and better. Students are currently being taught to learn to knit or crochet 20cm squares that will be sent Zimbabwe, officially the poorest country in the

World and Kascare's expanding branch.

With nearly 1,000,000 orphans alive in 2009, Zimbabwe has the highest number of orphans, in proportion to its population, than any other country in the world, according to UNICEF. As many as one in four children in Zimbabwe are orphaned as a result of parents dying from AIDS.
