## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Staff, Students and Friends of our Marymede Community,

Our Year 12 students completed their formal Secondary education on Wednesday 24 October with their Graduation Liturgy at St. Francis of Assisi in Mill Park which was followed by the Valedictory Dinner at the Plenty Ranges Arts & Convention Centre. I trust the students and their parents enjoyed the celebrations.

The VCE Units 3 & 4 exams began yesterday for our Senior students. This can be a difficult time for students and families, and I encourage parents to spoil their son/daughter with a favourable meal or simply let them know how proud you are of them.

## Years 10 & 11 Exams

The Years 10 & 11 students will begin their examination period on Tuesday 12 November. I urge our students to spend the lead-up time thoroughly revising, whether by going over notes, doing additional reading or attempting questions from past exam papers.

### **Setting Goals**

With Year 12 classes over, some of our younger students are often tempted to think that the end is in sight and lose focus. Indeed, the opposite is the case and I encourage them to set some significant goals for the remainder of the term. These may include increased involvement in class discussions, completing unfinished work, a higher test result or a better assignment. Now is the time to act.

## Students Not Returning to Marymede in 2020

I ask parents to please let the College know as soon as possible if your son or daughter is not returning to Marymede next year. This information will help us in planning staffing for 2020.

### Year 7 2020

We have in excess of 100 Year 7 students coming to Marymede from other Primary schools next year. We were delighted to meet the students and their parents at our PAT Testing last Saturday. The test results will help us in the planning for our Year 7 students when they commence Secondary school with us next year.

Last night we held our Year 7 2020 Transition Evening for our parents. Thank you to the many parents who attended. I hope we were able to address any of the concerns you may have with your son or daughter transitioning to our Secondary school next year. A big thank you to Mrs Carla Piccolo and the staff who were in attendance.

# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

## Year 9-12 2019 Subject Confirmation

Students in Years 9-12 in 2019 received confirmation of their proposed subjects last week. Students are allocated to subjects based on the preferences they submitted via the online portal in Term 3. However, if any students would like to apply to make changes to their subjects, Change of Subject Application forms can be collected from the Founders Office.

Several current Year 10 & 11 were conditionally enrolled into subjects for next year. As quickly as possible after Semester 2 examination results are available, we will communicate as quickly as possible with families to either confirm student enrolment in these studies or to discuss alternative subjects or pathways.

### **Year 9-11 Examinations and Commencement**

Students in Years 10 & 11 will shortly receive their examination schedule in preparation for the Semester examinations from November 12-15, while Year 9 students will complete their examinations from December 3-5. Students should already be studying for examinations and starting to think about how they can ensure they maximise their results. To help, the following tips are indispensable:

#### 1. Go where the marks are

Often students open an examination paper and answer the questions in order from first to last. However, in most cases, the highest scoring questions are located toward the end of the exam. That means, if a student runs out of time, they miss out on answering the questions worth the most marks! And the impact on their overall score on the paper can be significant. Instead, students need to use their reading time to work out which questions are worth the most marks. When writing time starts, rather than start at the front, students should begin by completing the questions worth the greatest marks and work backwards (by marks) from there. That way, if a student runs out of time, the questions they miss are those worth the least number of marks.

#### 2. Read carefully - including the secret clues!

Often students lose marks on exams because they don't answer the question that is being asked. Sometimes they:

- Read key words and assume (sometimes incorrectly) what they're being asked
- Read the first part of the question in a multi-part question - and ignore the rest
- Don't pay attention to the command word eg.
   Describe, Compare, Explain etc and think about what it is asking them to do.
- Including too little information or detail in a question worth several marks

To ensure you have understood the question, students need to use reading time to read every question twice and use strategies to focus on what it is asking; for example:

- Highlighting the command word eg. Identify, Analyse, Justify
- Mentally rewording the question in their own words (eg. thinking about how they would explain to a young sibling what the question means)
- Highlighting the different parts of the question
- Checking the number of marks allocated to a question as a general rule, one mark is given for each specific point made in answer to the question (eg. if a question is worth 4 marks, students can assume the teacher is wanting them to include at least 4 ideas, processes or pieces of information in their answer the more marks, the more complex or detailed an answer should be)

Once you have written an answer, reread the question along with your answer to check that your response matches the question.

### 3. Leave nothing blank

This is the simplest rule of all – always answer everything. Despite all of students' worst fears, teachers want to give students marks in examinations wherever they can. Even in a wrong answer, a teacher may be able to find some marks where a student has shown some of the required knowledge. But when a student leaves a question blank, they are guaranteeing they will get zero marks for that question. When you are unsure of an answer, offer any potentially relevant ideas, information or strategies you can think of, and give yourself the possibility of at least gaining some marks - sometimes, these marks will be the difference between passing and failing (and being asked to resit if you're in Year 10 or 11). Often, in attempting to brainstorm an answer to a question they are not confident about, students may find themselves recalling knowledge they didn't realise they had stored away!

Following the examinations, students enrolled in VCE in 2020 will undertake the Year 11 and 12 Commencement Program from Monday 18 November to Friday 29 November. The Commencement Program will include one full two-week cycle of classes in which teachers will begin introducing the first units of work; it is essential that all students attend the full program. Students enrolled in Year 11 or Year 12 VCAL will receive information from the VCAL Coordinator about their Commencement Program.

## Staying Sun Smart at Outside School Hours Care

At Outside School Hours Care, the children always enjoy playing outdoors – whether it be group sport activities, playing on the playground or even doing homework with some fresh air. Whatever the activity is, we put utmost importance on the health and safety of the children, so remaining sun smart is always a priority.

Our sun smart policy complies with the SunSmart Guidelines to ensure all children, educators and visitors are protected from over-exposure to UV radiation while maintaining adequate vitamin D levels. Sensible sun protection does not put people at risk of vitamin D deficiency.

UV radiation causes harmful effects on health, though we can't see or feel it. Prolonged exposure under the sun's UV can cause sunburn, skin and eye damage, and skin cancer. Protecting your skin from UV exposure is important at any age, but it is particularly important during childhood and adolescence as their skin is vulnerable to damaging sun rays.

To stay sun smart this summer, children are required to wear their hats during outdoor activities for adequate sun protection. We suggest wide-brimmed hats as these cover the neck, ears and shoulders – these areas are prone to sunburn. Apart from hats, children are also advised to wear sunscreen which we provide at our services.
