# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

#### Semester Two

On June 18, Semester 2 will begin for all students from Prep – 12. This means that any student currently studying a semester-long subject will move into their second semester subjects from the last two weeks of Term 2. These single semester subjects include:

- Prep to 4 students in Visual Arts and Performing Arts;
- Year 7 students in Languages, Visual Arts and Drama;
- Year 8 students in the Digital Technology, Food Technology, Visual Arts and Dance;
- Year 9 students' elective studies; and

• Year 10 students' studies in Humanities, Science, Health & Physical Education, Visual Arts, Technology, Performing Arts.

Students' Semester 2 timetables will be available in the week prior to this change.

# **General Achievement Test (GAT)**

On June 12, all students enrolled in one or more Unit 3 VCE or VET study will sit the General Achievement Test (GAT). While the GAT does not directly contribute to students' ATAR, it serves two important roles for students in their final year of their secondary studies in VCE.

The GAT acts as an 'insurance policy' for students. In situations where students are impacted by significant illness or serious personal circumstances at the time of a VCE external assessment and the result they achieve is not a fair reflection of their learning and achievement in the study, they may apply for a Derived Examination Score. Their GAT result is a key measure used in calculating a derived score and, as such, the students benefit from performing as well as possible on the GAT in terms of the derived score they will receive if things go wrong.

The GAT is also used as a moderation tool when the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) allocate study scores based on students' results on the final examinations and in their course work. Once again, students benefit from performing as well as possible on the GAT.

The General Achievement Test is a test of general knowledge and skills in

- Written communication
- Mathematics, Science and Technology
- Humanities, the arts and social sciences.

The test examines the general knowledge and skills that students gain throughout their schooling. It is not something students need to specifically study for; however, students may benefit from being familiar with the types of questions and tasks they will encounter on the GAT and with the overall structure of the test.

It is mandatory that all students enrolled in one or more scored Unit 3 study (ie. a Year 12 subject) attend the General Assessment Test (GAT) as scheduled on June 12. If any student encounters emergency circumstances on the day of the GAT, they must contact VCE Coordinator, Mr Vincenzo Rovetto immediately. Students will receive further information by email regarding the arrangements for the GAT, including seating arrangements, marshalling times and other key details.

# **Semester One Examinations**

Year 9-11 should be in full swing preparing for the Semester One examinations from June 12-15.

As we tell our students each year, it is very important that students take the opportunity in Years 9-11 to develop their examination skills in preparation for VCE. In VCE, the examination scores account for at least 50% of their final results. As such, students' results in their Year 10 & 11 mid-year examinations are a key factor in approving their VCE subject choices in 2020.

Students will have the opportunity to submit subject preferences for 2019 in Term 3 and will be guaranteed approval in their selected studies for Year 10 & 11 if they have achieved a minimum of 60% in the examination(s) in related studies. Students must achieve a minimum of 50% in both their English and Religious Education examinations to be approved to commence or continue in VCE.

Students who struggle to achieve a satisfactory result in the semester examination are unlikely to be approved to study related subjects in 2020. However, we aim to give students every opportunity to consolidate their learning and, as such, students who achieve a result below 50% will have the opportunity to re-sit examinations at school on Monday July 1. For students who are required to re-sit examination, the original mark will appear on semester reports; however, the re-sit mark will be considered in the subject selection process. Students required to attend a re-sit will be notified as early as possible in the week prior to July 1 to give them the opportunity to seek feedback from their Semester 1 teacher and identify the areas of the examination they need to revise and consolidate prior to the re-sit day.

# **Trial Examinations**

Year 12 VCE students and Year 11 students enrolled in accelerated studies will complete their Unit 3 trial examinations from July 1-3. These trial examinations are an important part of their preparations for the end-of-year examinations in October and November this year. The trial examinations are compulsory and any students who encounter emergency circumstances on the day of their examination(s) must contact VCE Coordinator, Mr Vincenzo Rovetto at
