FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Staff, Students and Friends of our Marymede Community,

Premier Daniel Andrews in his media conference last Sunday announced that Prep – Year 2, Year 11 and 12 students and Year 10 students enrolled in a VCE or VCAL program and specialist school students are able to return on campus from Monday 12 October. Senior students undertaking the General Achievement Test will be able to come into school on Wednesday 7 October.

At this stage, Years 3 – 10 students will not be returning to school in the first three weeks of Term 4. The Premier gave no indication that large indoor public gatherings will be able to take place in the near future. The College's Senior Leadership Team – in light of the Premier's announcements – will now finalise the format of the end of year celebrations of learning. It would now appear unlikely that the Sacramental celebrations will be able to take place next term. I will be in email communication to parents next week to confirm these arrangements.

R U OK? Day

I acknowledge the initiative of our staff and senior students in planning activities for our R U OK Day this week. It is important at this time of the term to support our students who are starting to feel the impact of home schooling and lack of interaction with their extended family and friends.

Marymede students from P-12 have participated in age-appropriate R U OK? Activities across this week, beginning with the extended AM assembly time on Monday morning and including Year 12 students reaching out to connect with younger students. We are grateful to our College Wellbeing Team and other Wellbeing leaders for assisting staff in preparing these resources, and especially acknowledge our Year 12 VCAL students who prepared a number of the R U OK? resources.

Many factors can contribute to someone feeling low. It isn't always easy to know whether someone is OK, particularly if they haven't talked about it or children have yet to recognise the importance of changes in behaviour. However, there are signs children can become familiar with which could indicate that a friend may not be OK.



Children cannot be expected to fix someone's problems, nor know the best way to help and support. However, they can be encouraged to listen to what their friend is saying, let them know they care and tell a teacher, school counsellor or trusted adult if they are worried about their friend. By promoting an environment of positive peer support and accessing support channels via an adult, children can learn that asking, 'Are you OK?' is a key life skill.

Managing student illness during COVID-19

In order to minimise health risks, all students and staff who are in any way unwell have been advised to stay home and to seek a COVID-19 test. Further advice (attached below) has been published by the CECV for managing students who are adjudged unwell upon arrival at school or who become unwell during the school day. These guidelines apply to the small number of students currently on campus under Stage 4 restrictions and will apply to students when face-to-face teaching resumes on-campus in Term 4 (as determined by the government).

On-campus assessments for VCE, VET & VCAL Unit 3-4 students

Under the Victorian Government Stage 4 allowances for essential assessment, Unit 3-4 VCE / VCAL / VET students are permitted on-campus to conduct assessments and practical sessions essential for assessment where it is not reasonably practical for those assessments to be undertaken from the student's home or that require access to facilities, resources, equipment or materials for practical assessments that are unable to be conducted via remote learning. The VCAA has confirmed that the Stay at Home Directions across Victoria do enable students and parents transporting students to travel beyond the 5km radius travel restriction when travelling to and from these assessment sessions.

Most of these assessment sessions will take place from 3.45pm to ensure that student class time is not compromised and to enable travel time after conclusion of period 5 classes. These sessions will be COMPULSORY as they are the formal assessment of learning for Unit 3-4 studies. Only students who have a medical certificate or a DHHS letter indicating quarantine due to COVID-19 testing are exempt: students in this situation must contact Mr Rovetto (VCE Coordinator) to negotiate the sitting of their assessment.

Unit 3-4 students who are required on-site for assessment or practical preparations will do so under the following conditions:

- Students must wear full College Winter uniform
- Students attending for an onsite assessment must enter via Main Reception.
- Temperature testing will occur upon arrival
- Students must wear a face covering (mask) at all times
- In the assessment room, students will be allocated a seat: they must remain only in this seat
- Students may not borrow any equipment from other students nor the College for the assessment.
- Students using specialist equipment must sanitise their hands before and after using the equipment.
 The College will disinfect all equipment before and after student use.
- Students must maintain social distancing at all times.
 Seating in assessment areas is configured to ensure
 1.5m between desks in all directions

- Students must exit the college immediately upon conclusion of the assessment session
- Students with a temperature 37.5 degrees Celsius or above or exhibiting symptoms compatible with COVID-19 (such as fever, cough or sore throat) may not attend onsite. These students must obtain a Medical certificate and should seek testing for COVID-19 before attending the campus.

Your child's VCE, VET or VCAL teacher will inform students via email of times they are required on-campus: it is recommended that parents print the email from the teacher to show that the travel is for a permitted purpose.

Stay safe, stay home: extension of Home Learning into Term 4

As you will be aware, Victorian Government has extended Remote Learning for all students until **Friday 9 October 2020**, with a staggered return of P-2 and VCE & VCAL students from Monday 12 October (more details about this will be released in the



week of 5-9 October). This means that the vast majority of students will continue their learning from home and there will be no learning conducted by teachers on-campus. This government decision has been made to increase physical distancing across the population and reduce the transmission of coronavirus (COVID-19). Therefore, all students who have an adult at home must learn from home.

As noted by Premier Dan Andrews when announcing the Stage 4 restrictions,

'Only those who are still working on-site will be able to send their kids to school. ...What I can't have is to have more teachers, more staff, more students and parents moving around the community than is absolutely necessary. I know that will be incredibly challenging for a number of people who perhaps are working from home. But there's simply no choice. We've all got to make a contribution to less movement rather than more. Less spread of this virus rather than more.'

Provision exists for a very limited number of Prep - Year 10 students to conduct their Remote Learning on-campus under the following strict government categories:

- Children whose parents work in one of the defined essential continuing industries (a Permitted Worker as announced on 3 August by the Victorian Government) and are unable to arrange adult supervision.
- Vulnerable children in out of home care, children known to child protection and other agencies
- Children with a disability may only attend if they fit one of the above two categories

Parents / carers applying under the 'Permitted Worker Scheme' must supply their Permitter Worker Permit to the college by emailing nicole.lawrenson@marymede.vic.edu.au

Most of the adults engaged in supervision of P-10 students on-campus will not be teachers: The P-10 teachers will be actively engaged in conducting and preparing Home Learning programs. P-10 students on-campus will be engaged in the exact same Home Learning Program as students learning from home. Please click on this link to email the College Attendance officer and request the online permission form if your P-10 child fits the requirements above and will need to attend one or more days.

All parents and carers are reminded that if their child is unwell in any way they must not come to school. Students adjudged by College Nurses to be unwell will be sent home.

Restricted Entry & Procedures for Students On-campus

Please note that entry and exit points to the campus are currently limited as a further measure for protecting the health of our staff and students. Parents will not be permitted to enter the campus by foot or vehicle until further notice.

For the small number of Prep – Year 10 students who will be on-campus, parents / guardians must park off-campus and accompany their child to personally sign-in their children at the Finance Office each day and await the result of their child's temperature check before departing.

VCE, VET & VCAL students attending for an onsite assessment must enter via Main Reception.

Mid-Semester Reports P-12 & Parent Teacher Interviews P-10

The Mid-Semester Reports for all students were published on Wednesday 9 September and can be accessed via the Parent Access Module (PAM). This report reflects on your child's learning dispositions and work habits as observed during this period of Home Learning.

Parent Teacher interviews will be held for students in Prep – Year 10 on Tuesday 15 September 4.00pm – 7.00pm and Thursday 17 September 2.30pm – 7.00pm. These conversations will be held via Zoom and are an important

opportunity for parents, students and teachers to celebrate the work your child has already completed and discuss the best ways that we can support your child as they move forward in their learning. Bookings are now open on PAM. Further information about the interviews was emailed earlier this week.

2021 Class Construction

Forward planning for next year is well underway and we are currently considering student class allocation for 2021. When constructing classes there are number of factors considered including social and emotional requirements, standardised testing data and behavioural support. Our intention is always to create well balanced, positive learning environments for all students. Should you need to make the College aware of any additional information that could assist us in our class construction please contact the relevant Director of Students by Friday 9 October.

Unit 3/4 Trial Examinations

This year we are again offering a full program of trial VCE examinations for your child leading into their final exams in November and December. These present an excellent opportunity for students to test their knowledge and sharpen their skills before the official exam period. The feedback received following the completion of these practice examinations will allow students to tailor their revision and provide a focus for future preparation. The duration and conditions for each examination is identical to that of those stipulated by VCAA. The trial examination period is from Monday 12 October to Thursday 15 October. There will be no VCE Unit 4 classes during this period and students are only required onsite when their exam is taking place. The examination timetable and the examination rules and expectations have been emailed to parents and students.

Enhanced Learning Program - Year 8 & 9, 2021

Marymede Catholic College currently offers an Enhancement Program for students in Years 7 & 8 who demonstrate strong academic aptitude and an exemplary approach to their studies. The Enhanced Learning Program gives students the opportunity to work at an accelerated pace in their core studies, as well as chances to pursue ideas, skills and understandings to a greater depth. The program will also focus on fostering student problem-solving, innovation and thinking skills; key skills for success in the 21st Century. Information regarding the application process for students who are entering Years 8 & 9 in 2021 was emailed to families last week. Applications close on Friday 18 September.

R U OK? day and Building Resilience in our students.

Parenting Educator Michael Grose advises that if we want our children to grow into resilient adults, we need to stop solving their problems for them.

Personal problem-solving is an under-rated skill shared by resilient children and adults. First identified alongside independence, social connection and optimism by early resilience-researchers in the US, the ability to solve your own problems is the basis of a child's autonomy and self-efficacy.

When parents solve all children's problems, we not only increase their dependence on adults, we also teach kids to be afraid of making mistakes and to blame themselves for not being good enough. As Grose noted in his book 'Anxious Kids', this is fertile ground for anxiousness and depressive illness.

So how can we raise kids to be courageous problem-solvers rather than self-critical, low risk-takers? Here are six practical ideas to get you started:

Top tips to help make kids courageous problem solvers

- 1. Turn requests for help into problems for kids to solve
- 2. Ask good questions to prompt problem-solving
- 3. Coach them through problems and concerns.
- 4. Prepare kids for problems and contingencies
- 5. Show a little faith
- 6. Applaud mistakes and stuff ups.

- 1. Identify the problem
- 2. Think about why it is a problem
- 3. Brainstorm possible solutions to the problem
- 4. Evaluate the solutions to the problem.

News from Victoria University

Important changes to Bachelor of Nursing at VU

Victoria University is introducing the CASPer test (domestic students only) and an ATAR to the applications process for the Bachelor of Nursing for 2021 entry.

CASPer is a scenario-based test, designed to grade the 'soft skills' of applicants – their strengths and suitability for the profession. While VU is the first university in Australia to introduce CASPer for nursing, it is following the success of universities in Canada and the US which use a similar test for pre-nursing students.

Students are also reminded that besides the CASPer test, they must also meet the VCE requirements of: Units 1 and 2: satisfactory completion in two units (any study combination) of any Mathematics or Units 3 and 4: any Mathematics; Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 30 in English (EAL) or at least 25 in English other than EAL.

New Courses in 2021

Bachelor of Applied Movement Sciences/Master of Physiotherapy

This new 4.5-year dual degree will prepare students to become a physiotherapist and use rehabilitation, injury prevention and exercise to improve people's quality of life. This course prepares work-ready graduates through clinical placements in

public hospitals, private health, sports, aged and community care, paediatrics, heart and lung disease and stroke with a person centred focus on mental health and wellness as well as cultural diversity and Indigenous health.

Important Notice for Domestic Medicine Applicants

VTAC's confirmation that Year 12 results will now be released on 30 December 2020, has meant that Monash has had to make some changes to the MMI interview process for 2021 entry in order to meet the VTAC selection round on 14 January 2021. Most interviews will now be held in mid-December 2020 and selection for these interviews will be based on a ranking of applicants' UCAT test scores only.

Importantly, a second round of interviews will be held in early January 2021, for Victorian and rural interstate applicants. Selection will be based on a combination of final Year 12 aggregate scores and UCAT test scores as per the usual process. Interview dates will be posted on the Important Dates page and are subject to change. Applicants should make themselves available for all published dates if they wish to remain eligible for Medicine at Monash.

Interviews will follow the same scenario-based, multi-station format, but are highly likely to be conducted online via Zoom with fewer stations than in previous years i.e., to include 6 virtual stations. There is no additional preparation required for the interviews and applicants selected for an interview will be briefed accordingly. Shortlisted applicants will be invited to attend an interview via email (please check all fail and spam email folders) and will be required to log in to an online system to self-allocate a time to attend. Once the system closes, changes will not be permitted, and late requests cannot be accommodated.
