Dear Parents, Staff, Students and Friends of our Marymede Community,

### Staff Professional Learning Day – 11 July

We were thrilled to have Fr. Elio Capra return to our college to work with the staff on the first day of Term 3, Monday July 11. Fr. Elio is a Salesian Priest who has over 40 years experience teaching in our catholic schools and lecturing tertiary students at the Australian Catholic University in Melbourne.

The staff found Fr. Elio to be a very engaging presenter. He is very passionate about Catholic Education and the crucial role staff play in catholic schools in helping our students on their faith journey.

### World Youth Day in Krakow

## DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP – YEAR 12

### Year 10-12 2017 Subject Selections

The online portal for current Year 9-11 students to submit their subject preferences for next year opened this morning and will remain open until midnight on August 8. Students received their Student Code and Password for the portal from their House Coordinator in Tutor Group.

Students wanting to apply to include an accelerated VCE or VET study in their program can collect the acceleration application form from the Founders Office; the completed form must be submitted by August 5.

The presentations from our recent VCE/VET/VCAL Information Evening and Year 10 Subject Selection Evenings are available on SIMON and PAM along with copies of the Year 10 Subject Handbook and the Senior Certificates Handbook which outline the subjects offered in 2017.

### Primary Curriculum 2017

We are currently reviewing the Primary Curriculum for 2017 looking for opportunities to enhance the learning experiences for our primary students. Some of our key priorities are to:

- Ensure we are thoroughly addressing all of the learning outcomes of the Victorian Curriculum, particularly in the areas of Science and Technology;
- Make use of the opportunities available in a P-12 school to give primary students greater access to the specialist facilities and teachers from secondary;
- Continue to strengthen student outcomes in Numeracy and Literacy;
- Introduce a curriculum structure in upper primary that bridges the gap between primary and secondary, further easing the transition for students; and
- Ensure suitable teachers are used to teach subjects that require specialist knowledge or skills.

We look forward to sharing some of the exciting developments for the primary curriculum later this year when we complete this review process and to the wonderful learning opportunities that lie ahead for our primary students.

## Semester Reports

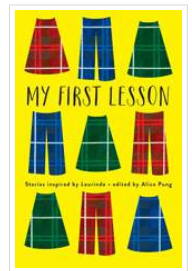
Having received such a strong response to our parent reporting survey, we have spent significant time exploring the responses received to identify opportunities to improve our semester reports. Overwhelmingly, two key messages emerged from the survey data in both primary and secondary

- That families wanted reports to communicate more personalised information about their child, rather than feel that comments are too general or standard.
- That families wanted clearer information about their child's performance and to get a better sense of how their child's performance compared with the expectations.

We are currently developing a new report format that will particularly target these priorities and look forward to trialling this new format for the end-of-year reports. Thank you to all families who responded to the survey including the many parents who took time and effort to include valuable and constructive comments that have offered us a very clear direction for the redevelopment of our semester reports.

## Young Author

Finally, congratulations to Year 12 student, Ysabel Dungca whose short story, *The Art of Pouring Water*, was recently selected for inclusion in an anthology of writing by young Australians entitled *My First Lesson*, to be published by Black Inc Books in September. Twenty Five stories were selected from hundreds of entries and Ysabel's contribution is a beautifully written and highly original piece. I wouldn't be at all surprised to see *The Art of Pouring Water* popping up in English classes and writing clubs at Marymede, both as a beautiful text for students to read and study, and as an inspiration to students about what is possible when we are willing to take risks and seize opportunities.

### Year 9 Reflection Day

## Student Safety and Wellbeing

The safety and wellbeing of student's is of upmost importance to us, therefore we are concerned about the number of Primary students being dropped off unsupervised on College grounds too early before or remaining on campus after school.

Please note that teachers commence their yard duty supervision in the playground at 8:20am and it concludes at 3:40pm. Unless a student is attending Before School Care and/ or After School Care, no primary students should be on the College campus before 8:20am or after 3:40pm.

We are very fortunate at Marymede Catholic College to have Before and After School Care provided by Camp Australia, which enables parents/guardians to access care for their primary school aged child/ren in the mornings and afternoons outside of the times that teachers are on supervision duty in the College grounds.

Please be aware of the policy which has been published previously in the College newsletter and on our website. **Any primary student who is on the College campus before 8:20am will be taken to Before School Care** where they will be supervised until 8:45am. Camp Australia will charge parents for supervision of their child/ren.

We thank you for your support in ensuring the safety for all students at Marymede.

## Policy - Student Supervision Before and After School

The safety and wellbeing of our students at Marymede is very important to us. We are very fortunate at Marymede Catholic College to have an on-site provider of Before and After School Care provided by Camp Australia.

This service provided by and administered enables parents/guardians to access care for their primary school aged child/ren in the mornings and afternoons outside of the times that teachers are on supervision duty in the College grounds.

Before School Care provided by Camp Australia runs from 6:30am – 8:45am, Monday to Friday and After School Care runs from 3:15pm – 6:00pm, Monday to Friday. Before and after these times, there is no supervision provided by the College on the College grounds.

The teachers commence their yard duty supervision in the playground at 8:20am and it concludes at 3:40pm. Unless a student is attending Before School Care and/or After School Care, no students should be on the College Campus before 8:20am or after 3:40pm.

Any primary student who is on the College campus before 8:20am will be taken to Before School care where they will be

supervised until 8:45am. Camp Australia will charge parents for supervision of their child/ren.

The same applies to any students who are not collected from the College campus by 3:40pm. They will be taken to After School care, where they will be supervised until they are collected by a parent/guardian. Camp Australia will charge parents for supervision.

Primary students are unable to use the College Library as a before or after hours supervision area, unless they are supervised by a Parent or Guardian. Primary students with Secondary school siblings are unable to be supervised by their Secondary school sibling in the library and would also need to abide by the above.

## Transitions

The recent Year 5 Secondary School Experience and Transition evening was a wonderful opportunity for our Year 5 students to become even more comfortable within the secondary classrooms with Secondary Teachers. As part of my study in a Masters of Leadership I recently conducted a Literature Review of research into transitions from Year 6 to Year 7, this is an excerpt of findings for students who change schools from Primary to Secondary:

"It is widely understood that transition from primary school to secondary school for the general population is a critical time for the wellbeing and successful progress through adolescence (Hanewald, 2013; Topping, 2011; Jindal-Snape & Miller, 2008) with well-planned and implemented transition programs required to support students, families and teachers (Hanewald, 2013). Research by Jindal-Snape and Miller (2008) identifies clearly the stressors associated with transition. These include: discontinuity in learning and physical space; changes in pedagogy; different teacher-student relationships and expectations; fluctuating/changing peer relationships; puberty. According to Newman and Blackman (2002), if these stressors are managed well a successful transition takes place, however if a child is not able to cope, developmental damage may occur."

This clearly reinforces the strength of a P-12 School context with transition being seamless from Year 6 to Year 7, and indeed at Marymede the transition program beginning in Year 4 and continuing through Year 5 and Year 6. It is a strong advantage to the wellbeing of our children.

### Year 12 RE Seminar Program

Last Monday Year 11 students joined the Year 12's and attended the presentation by their inspirational guest speaker, Ben Pettingill. Ben sees life in a different way to most. At age 16, Ben lost 98% of his eyesight overnight to a rare genetic syndrome, Lebers Hereditary Optic Neuropathy. This sudden traumatic event turned his world upside down, redefined everything he knew and crushed all his childhood dreams in an instant. Yet it was also the beginning of him seeing life with a whole new view. Ben grew up in country Victoria, and after completing High School, he went on to University to study Business. It was during studies that Ben realised his passion is

to inspire everyone to see the world with a whole new view. This is what Ben calls True or Limitless Vision.

Ben spoke to students about his very unique lifestyle which includes motorbike riding, water skiing and travelling extensively by himself despite having only 2% vision. Ben is also the only legally blind person in the world to have competed, untethered, in the internationally recognised Spartan Obstacle Course Race. Ben demonstrated a natural ability to capture the imagination of all students; his story was exciting and transformational. He unpacked his message with enthusiasm and humour. He used his experiences and the solutions he has developed to make a long lasting, positive impact on the students. It was very evident that his greatest passion is adding value through empowering students to discover True and Limitless Vision.

### A Year 12 Product Inspired By the Earth Tones and Native Wildlife of Zimbabwe

Tinotenda Mubayiwa was born in Zimbabwe and is one of many creative year 12 students at Marymede. Using his skills in Product Design, coupled with those from Visual Communication and Design, he is making a unique padded seat with storage for toys, to be used in his little brothers bedroom.

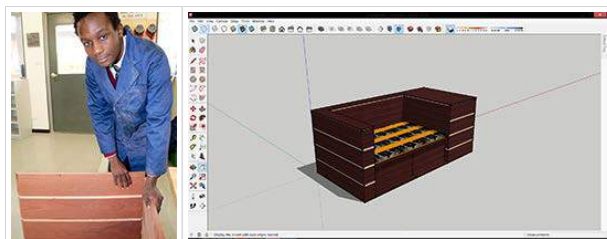
The seat is made using the deep red colours of Jarrah contrasted against the light colour of Victorian Ash, both

Australian native timbers. The Vic Ash creates a clever pattern of shadow lines around the seats arms and back rest.

Tino's Zimbabwean heritage has impacted on the way he thinks creatively as he used the fabric designs his mother Sweena had stored away, to inspire the design for the seating cover and scatter cushions that will nestle on the seat.

Using coloured pencils Tino drew the repeated printed pattern featuring elephants and lions in earth tones. Next he changed the idea into a digital imaging using Adobe Illustrator, a Computer Aided Drawing/Design (CAD) program. This digital design was emailed half way across the world to "Spoonflower" in America. Within 10 days he received his original textiles design back as 2 metres of fabric ready to be made into cushion covers.

His next challenge is to learn how to sew but with the assistance of Melanie Montemurro, a volunteer textiles student from RMIT, Tino will overcome this minor lack of technical skill.

## **Year 12 Legal Studies Excursion to the Melbourne Law Courts**

The Year 12 Legal Studies Students had one of the most enriching experiences when visiting both the County and Supreme Courts of Victoria. Our very own fates were decided in the Supreme Court where we participated in a mock trial, which encouraged each of us to represent a real member of the courtroom who had a particular role in a criminal trial.

The Supreme Court's architecture was truly remarkable dating back centuries where Ned Kelly's trial was heard and where he was sentenced to death. The history of the Supreme Court is fascinating, with a huge library containing historic events, architectural information, past customs used by judges including the black handkerchief, which was placed on a judge's head to inform the accused that the judge's verdict meant a sentence to death.

When visiting the County Court we witnessed a robbery trial. The accused was being interrogated by the defence and prosecution barristers and we were surprised by the ongoing repetition of certain questions that each lawyer would ask the accused in hope of finding either the accused individual's guilt or innocence in the case.

We also observed how a jury is empanelled through the jury duty selection methods. We learnt that any individual within society aged 18 years and over can be selected for jury duty and must attend empanelment unless there is a liable and legitimate reason as to why they cannot, which is decided by a judge at the time of empanelment. We also participated in a jury empanelment where some of us were able to be selected for jury duty and we were also shown the jury deliberation room. We learnt a lot about the roles of individuals within the courtroom and what they are able to do to assist in creating a fair and effective trial.

This legal excursion to the County and Supreme Courts was an incredible experience that left most of us in awe of how our legal system operates and gave us an insight into how the legal system tries its utmost best to provide individuals with a fair and unbiased trial in order to achieve justice in society for both now and in the future.

## **Year 10 Italian Excursion**

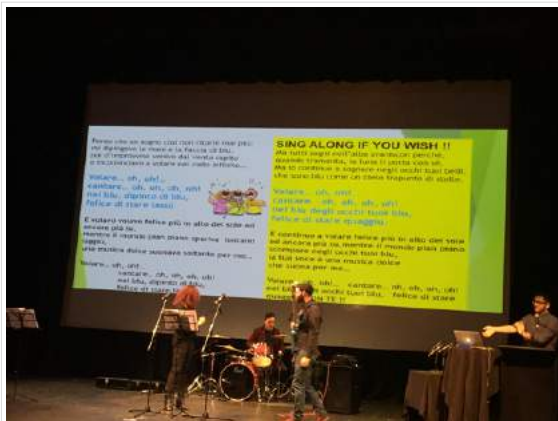

## 2018 Enrolments
