School Review

Over the past three days, our College has been involved in a School Review which takes place every four years. The reviewers, Tony McGruther, Trevor Gordon and Denise Mugavin have interviewed the Senior Leadership Team, a number of staff, the Primary and Secondary Student Leaders and a group of parents. The focus has been centred around the quality of the Learning and Teaching taking place across the year levels at our College. I look forward to receiving the final report as it will help us in setting our goals going forward.

Semester 1 Reports

Our teachers are busily finalising their Semester 1 Reports which will be able to be accessed from our Parent Access Module on Thursday 27 June. The reports will give parents a clear indication of their children's progress in the first semester. I thank staff for their efforts in preparing the reports.

P-12 Assembly – 20 June

Today we held our P-12 Assembly in the Fitness Centre. A number of students were recognised for their efforts in the Athletics Carnivals which were held earlier this term. The highlight of the assembly was the performance of the Years 5-9 students who will be appearing in the musical production 'The Lion King Jr' in the first week of Term 3. Tickets are selling fast and I encourage all members of our College Community to come along and see our talented junior actors perform on stage.

P-12 Mass of the Sacred Heart – 27 June

Dropping Off and Picking Up of Students

In the past fortnight, I have been contacted by both staff on Yard Duty (before and after school) and parents with concerns about the safety of our children at the peak times in the morning and at the end of the school day. I ask parents to please use the drop off zone in the College grounds rather than stopping in the centre of the traffic lane and asking your son or daughter to weave through other moving cars.

A parental concern has also been raised about the 'near misses' at the zebra crossing going across to the train station carpark. It has been reported that some of our parents are late to pick up that students are using the zebra crossing and are having to brake suddenly to avoid an accident.

I ask that all our parents who are driving their children to and from school each day to please be mindful that it is a very busy time and that there are many, many students crossing roads to get either to or from school.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING NEWS PREP - YEAR 12

Subject Selection 2020

In Term 3, students in Years 7-11 will begin the process of submitting their preferences for the subjects they wish to study in 2020. For Year 7s, this will mean nominating the language – Italian or Japanese – they want to study next year; for Year 8s, this will be the opportunity to nominate the electives they would like to study. Year 10-12 students will have choices to make about most of their subjects for 2020.

In addition, next term our Year 12s will be exploring post-school pathways and most will be submit VTAC applications to apply for university courses.

To support students and parents to make these choices for 2020, we will have a number of important Information Evenings that will provide the key information and advice needed to assist families with these important decisions:

Year 10 2020 Subject Information Evening- Monday July 29 (7-8pm)

Year 11 2020 Subject/Pathway Information Evening – Tuesday July 30 (7-8pm)

VTAC Information Evening – Tuesday August 6 (7-8pm)

We would encourage all parents to attend these important selection processes to ensure you feel confident to support your child through these applications.

For students in Years 9-11 wanting to start looking at the subject offerings available next year, the 2020 Senior Certificates Subject Information Handbook – outlining the Year 11 and 12 studies on offer will be available on SIMON and the College Website from the last day of term. The Year 10 Subject Selection Booklet and Year 9 Electives Booklet will be available early in Term 3 and families will be notified when these guides are able to be accessed.

Reports

Next week semester reports will be available and, amongst the other key information on the reports is an indication of each child's achievement this semester in comparison to the Victorian Curriculum Standards. The following explanation may assist families to interpret the information displayed about the Achievement Standards on the Report.

The reports show a red T-shaped line that reflects the typical progress of students in a year level. For instance, as shown below, students in Grade 4 are expected to working towards a Level 4 Standard throughout their Grade 4 year, typically achieving level 4 at the end of the year. Midway through the year, the vertical line sits midway between Level 3 and Level 4 (at 3.5); however, the achievement standards recognise that there is variation in student learning and acknowledge students as working 'At Standard' if they are performing anywhere in the 6-month range between Level 3 and 3.5.

The letters P, C and N, may be displayed within the circles on the graph to offer further indications about their learning progress.

- P shows where the student was placed in their previous report (6 months earlier)
- C shows where they are placed currently.
- In cases where an N is displayed, a student has generally continued to progress but has not yet achieved the next stage of progress toward the standard and so the graph shows no change.

Trial and Resit Examinations

A final reminder that our Year 12 students will be in at the College between July 1-3 for their compulsory trial examinations and some of our Year 10 & 11 students will be attending examination resits on July 1. The first examination on July 1 begins at 8.45am and students should be campus no later than 8.30am; marshalling will commence at 8.30am and all students will be seated in the examination venue by 8.40am to begin reading time at 8.45am.

Students involved in examinations need to attend the College in their full winter school uniform. The canteen will be closed and students should bring their own food and drink if they are required on campus for more than one examination on any of the examination days. Students involved in the examinations are only required on campus when they have an examination.

Results of the Unit 3 Examinations and Year 10 & 11 Examination resits will be available in Term 3. Unit 3 Trial Examination results will be available via SIMON & PAM by Week 3 of the Term, while resit results will be emailed to parents in early August.
