DEPUTY PRINCIPAL WELLBEING AND OPERATIONS PREP – YEAR 12

Welcome to 2022

I extend a warm welcome to all families new to our Marymede community and a grateful 'Welcome back' to all returning families. We hope that families had a relaxing and enjoyable break together but are also mindful of the many families whose break was adversely affected by COVID cases in their home or family. We pray that all COVID-affected members of our community have recovered or will quickly recover.

While infections are widespread at present, it's pleasing to see both the rapid uptake of vaccination available to students aged 5 – 11 years old and the recent approval of booster shots for 16 – 17 year olds. The current COVID climate will see 2022 start differently to previous school years but with COVIDsafe measures familiar across 2020-2021. COVIDsafe requirements set by the Victorian Government and the CECV School Operations Guide that will govern the school to Friday 25 February are outlined below.

For all College events this year, parents and guardians are encouraged to regularly access the College calendar either via our website below or via PAM. Both of these calendars are kept up-to-date to reflect where events are required to be postponed or move to a virtual format. The restrictions up to 25 February have already resulted in the postponement of events such as our Opening School Mass, the PFC Colour Run, and forced all assemblies and staff meetings back into virtual mode.


COVID-Safe for 2022

As we continue to learn to live with COVID-19, the following measures are in place up to 25 February to ensure our College remains a safe environment for our students and staff:

Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) 'surveillance' testing: Each family has been supplied a 5-pack of RAT home-tests to be conducted on two school days each week across 1 – 11 February (an additional 5-pack will be distributed to cover 14 – 25 February). These should be used on two school days in each week, regardless of whether or not your child shows any COVID symptoms or may have been in contact with a positive case. If your child receives a positive RAT test result at any time, a parent or guardian must register this result through the Department of Health system via COVID-19 Positive Rapid Antigen Test Self-Reporting Form or 1800 675 398 (please also see the next point for informing the college).

There is no requirement to report a negative result.

N.B. Students who have previously tested positive for COVID-19, have completed their 7-day isolation period and are subsequently asymptomatic do not need to undertake RAT surveillance testing for 30 days (from their positive test or onset of symptoms, whichever is earlier).



Reporting positive COVID results: Should any student receive a positive RAT or PCR result, a parent or guardian must report this result to the College via the Marymede Positive COVID Result Notification Form .

The College will notify the school community through a daily email when a student or staff member has returned a positive COVID-19 result and had attended the College. This email will identify any classes affected and advise students to undertake a RAT and only return to school if they receive a negative result and are asymptomatic. Classes will generally not be sent home during the school day. Remote learning will only be considered as a localised, short-term, last-resort option.

Students who are unwell must stay home: The most important action school communities can take to reduce the risk of transmission of coronavirus (COVID-19), is to ensure that any unwell staff and students remain at home and get tested, even with the mildest of symptoms. Parents/carers should also consider getting a medical certificate from the child's treating GP to confirm that it is safe for them to attend school with persistent symptoms that may overlap with some of the symptoms of COVID-19 such as cough or runny nose (e.g. for students who suffer from hay fever).

Face Masks & Physical distancing: As per the directions of the Victorian Government, the following actions are mandatory:

- All staff, all adults and all students in Years 3 12 are required to wear a face mask indoors at all times.
- Prep Year 2 students are also strongly encouraged to wear a face mask when indoors.
- Parents and carers conducting drop-off and pick-up who are unable to maintain social distance should also wear a face covering.
- Face masks to be worn by individuals over the age of 8 when on public transport and school buses – unless you have a lawful exemption.
- Individuals over the age of 8 must carry a face mask at all times.

Limited parent entry to campus: All parent & guardian access to the campus is restricted and all parent involvement with activities on-campus is restricted for the foreseeable future. It

is therefore very important for parents to clearly communicate with your child exactly where they should meet you for either vehicle or pedestrian pick-up. Pedestrian Gate 3 (near the bus stop) provides the clearest line of sight for younger primary students needing to locate a parent for pedestrian pick-up. Parents of Prep and Year 1 students have been directly emailed the instructions for their 'soft start' pick-up and drop-off procedures.

QR code registration & vaccination requirement for on-campus entry: Where parents and visitors are granted permission to enter the school property (apart from very brief outdoor pickup / drop-off), this is conditional on acceptable proof of being fully vaccinated after completing QR code registration.

Limited car-parking on-campus: The Gate A car park will be open to enable Prep parents (only) to park for Prep drop-off and pick-up. All other parents will need to park off-site.

Vaccinations: COVID-19 vaccinations for students are not required for them to attend school but vaccination for eligible students is highly encouraged. For more information on how to book a vaccination, including important information about vaccination for children aged 5 to 11, visit the Vaccination information for children and teenagers page on the coronavirus.vic.gov.au website.

Additional COVIDsafe measures were also outlined in the Principal's letter emailed to families on Friday 28 January.

We thank all parents and carers and students for your patience, understanding and cooperation in assisting to keep our community safe.



Student Absences & late arrival / early departure

Parents and students are reminded that secondary students should not be on the campus prior to 8.00am and primary students should not be on-campus prior to 8.20am. Please contact Camp Australia should you child require care before 8.20am (or after 3.35pm).

When your child is going to be absent from school, is arriving late or leaving early, parents/guardians are reminded of the following process:

- Email absentees@marymede.vic.edu.au with your child's name, date of absence and the reason for the absence. You can also telephone the absentee line on 9407 9090 and leave a clear voicemail with your child's full name, year level and House, together with the reason for the absence. If you are having difficulties leaving a message on the absentee line and are unable to email, please contact Main Reception on 9407 9000.
- Students who arrive after 8.45am are required to go to main reception (opposite the train station) to sign in. Younger Primary students will be escorted by a staff member to their classroom.

 If your child is leaving school early, parents/guardians are to write an explanatory note and your child will be required to obtain an early leave pass from their Secondary Pastoral Teacher or Primary Core Teacher. When departing, the student will need to report to main reception to sign-out, again showing the note along with the Early Leave Pass.

Please ensure that communication of your child's absence/late arrival is sent no later than 9.30am on the day of the absence/late arrival. If you do not communicate your child's absence/late arrival by 9.30am and your child does not sign in upon late arrival you will receive an SMS message advising that your child is absent and requesting that you contact the College to confirm the absence/late arrival.

Carpark etiquette

As we begin a new year and many return to dropping off and picking up students via the College carparks it is worth revisiting some reminders to ensure the safest use of the College carparks and drop-off zones. We appreciate the frustration of slow-moving traffic and ask parents to focus on the safety of our students, some of whom are too young to have fully developed road sense. For the safety of our staff and students, parents are reminded to please be conscious of the following whenever driving through the College for morning drop-off or afternoon pickup (particularly in the Secondary carpark):

- Respect directions of staff on duty
- Obey 10km/h limits
- Drive only in directions indicated on road and respect indicators of single lane traffic areas



- Only allow your child(ren) to exit or enter the car at marked drop-off bays or while in a marked parking bay
- Do not stop across or block pedestrian crossings



- There is no onsite parking at present: do not exit your vehicle
- Do not use areas marked for staff parking: while they
 may appear vacant, staff do return from meetings
 and off-campus professional learning and there are
 part-time staff who arrive at various times during the
 day



The City of Whittlesea has also requested that all parents read the following pamphlets on parking and safety around schools and to apply to become a School Crossing Supervisor:

Photo Day: Monday 21 February

A reminder to current Marymede families that school photos are scheduled to take place during the school day on Monday 21 February 2022 with sibling photos taking place from 3.30 – 7.00pm. The College will use the services of National Photography who offer value packages and simplified ordering processes for our families. Students will be provided with personalised order forms including ordering and package details in the coming weeks.

Families wishing to arrange sibling photos will need to book your sibling photo session via instructions that will be emailed to families shortly. Please note that Sibling Photo bookings will close by Friday 18 February. Ordering instructions for sibling photos will be provided at the photo session.

Uniform expectations for all students are per the grooming standards in our Student Planner and as provided in the Principal's letter of 28 January, with all students expected to wear their full Summer Uniform (no P.E uniform allowed). Students in Years 7-12 will be required to wear their College Blazer. Any student who is determined by College staff to not meet the uniform and grooming requirements will not have their photo taken on 21 February and will not be included in class / year level photographs. A 'catch-up' day on Thursday 17 March will provide the opportunity for individual photos for students who are either absent or fail to meet the uniform and grooming requirements on 21 February.

Photos taken on the day will be used by the College for Student ID Cards and the College Yearbook, along with special year level related folios such as our Year 12 Graduation Folio.

Artist, Margherita explains,

"I felt in my heart the need to give an image of tribute to all the people who suffer marginalisation, war, hunger, despair, escape from their land, loneliness, illness... one day I looked at the images of African migrants who landed in Italy, who miraculously survived their escape into the sea, and shocking photos of all those people and children drowned in water. My heart got tight. The images of those people wrapped in emergency blankets reminded me of the Madonna of Loreto. I did not want to make the image of Mary royal, I wanted a simple emergency blanket to acquire royalty around her, since what is royal is the warmth of love that allows us to rescue and help each other.

The accompanying scripture:

'In everything, do to others as you would have them do to you.' Matthew 7:12

A deep desire of all is to feel loved, heard and to belong. The theme *Known and Loved, dignity for all,* reminds us that we are all created in God's image. If we are to truly live the Gospel message, then we must show love, respect and dignity towards every single person regardless of who they are.

RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS

Respectful Relationships at Marymede Catholic College

Marymede Catholic College is delighted to be entering its third year as a Respectful Relationships School.

The Respectful Relationships teaching and learning program is mapped against the personal capabilities of the Victorian Curriculum and is approved and supported by Melbourne Archdiocese of Catholic Schools (MACS).

Respectful Relationships is an evidence-based, whole school approach to building a school culture of positive attitudes and behaviours, based on equality. Respected institutions such as VicHealth and the Department of Education are behind the development of the Respectful Relationships program. It is further supported by evidence from the World Health Organisation, The Royal Commission into Family Violence and others.

We recognise that, as a Respectful Relationships school, Marymede is:

- a workplace where all staff and students should feel equally respected, safe, valued and have equal opportunities;
- a safe space where young people can learn about gender equality and respectful relationships, in and out of the classroom;
- part of the wider community that can model gender equality and respectful relationships.

Through our teaching and learning programs, our students are developing their understanding of the central importance of relationships in their lives. They are developing skills in how to build these relationships through positive and respectful interactions and consideration for others.

Topics in the program include:

- Emotional literacy
- Personal strengths
- Positive coping
- Problem solving
- Stress management
- Help-seeking
- Gender and identity
- Positive gender relations

We encourage parents to talk to your child/ren about what they are learning about in their Respectful Relationships lessons.

Marymede receives funding and ongoing training and support from the Department of Education to support the implementation of Respectful Relationships. We are also part of a community hub with other Catholic schools in the area.
