Medical Management Policy changes

In order to comply with the new MACS and Victorian Government policies regarding medical management, First Aid staff will no longer be able to distribute Panadol nor any medication that is not authorised by a doctor. This state-wide policy requires that a **Medication Authority Form** (available on PAM here) be completed by the student's medical practitioner or health practitioner and that any medication must have first been administered at home: a child must never have a medication for the first time at school. Parental permission is no longer sufficient for dispensing any form of medication.

This policy applies to all over-the-counter medication as well (e.g. Panadol, Naprogesic, Zyrtec, etc). The school is no longer permitted to keep a store of its own medication for to dispense any prescribed nor over-the-counter medications without a



Medical Authority Form signed by a doctor or registered health practitioner. Any medication that a child may require whilst at school must be supplied by parents, labelled with the child's name and handed in to the First Aid Office (this includes all over-the-counter medications). All parents will soon receive communication regarding the need to update each child's PAM Medical details in light of these changes.

Further clarification on parking vs. queuing on Williamsons Rd

Whittlesea Council have contacted the College to provide further clarification regarding the yellow lines now painted along Williamsons Rd (as publicised in the 16 October newsletter) and how this impacts parents and carers who wait in their car at the school gates or along Williamsons Rd prior to the gates being open, particularly Gates A and B.

Whittlesea Council draws parent / carer attention to the following clarifications:

- The provision for "stopped in a queue" only applies if the traffic is otherwise moving, i.e. if the school gate is open at the time and traffic is entering
- In the event a vehicle has stopped next to a yellow edge line and is deemed not stopped in the line of traffic, they would be 'stopped' contrary to REG 169 (see below). This includes stopping at a closed gate or stopping next to an occupied parking bay. If a number of vehicles are lined up waiting to enter a locked gate or occupied bay they will be deemed to be 'parked' contrary to law.

In short, any cars queued on the road prior to the opening of the school gates will be deemed to be 'parked' and may be fined by the Whittlesea Council or police in accordance with the following road rule:

ROAD SAFETY ROAD RULES 2017 - REG 169

No stopping on a road with a yellow edge line A driver must not stop at the side of a road marked with a continuous yellow edge line.


PB4L skills for Weeks 7 & 8: Responsibility & Resilience

Our PB4L Acknowledgement Cards are an additional measure for staff to recognise students displaying one or more of Marymede's positive behaviour expectations: Respect, Responsibility, Resilience, Safety. Students are encouraged to take their card home to show their parents, then return it to school to place in the weekly prize draw box. Each week one person from each year level will be randomly drawn to receive an additional reward for their positive behaviour: pictured below is our first PB4L Year 6 winner, Campbell.



The specific behaviour skills being taught this week and the focus of daily interactions for weeks 7 & 8 of Term 4 are:

- Secondary RESPONSIBILITY: Care for the environment
- Primary RESILIENCE: I am a good sport



COVIDsafe settings for Term 4: increased vigilance required

COVID cases have doubled across the state in the last fortnight – and risen noticeably at Marymede – hence the need to maintain vigilance and certain safety measures. Most particularly, symptomatic students and staff should continue to isolate at home until they are symptom-free (even with a clear RAT test).

In accordance with the latest CECV School Operations Guide (17 October), the following measures remain in place for Term 4 to ensure our College remains a safe environment for our students and staff:


• Reporting positive COVID results: When a student receives a positive RAT or PCR result, a parent or guardian should report this result to the college via the Marymede COVID Notification Form . Students should remain at home for a minimum of 5-days from testing positive and should only return when their symptoms have cleared, and their RAT tests are clear.

• Students who are unwell should stay home: The most important action school communities can take to reduce the risk of transmission of coronavirus (COVID-19) is to ensure that any unwell staff and students remain at home and get tested, even with the mildest of symptoms (and even with a negative RAT or PCR result).

Any child who displays symptoms at school will be sent to First Aid to be assessed. The First Aid team will contact parents to take home any symptomatic students. While awaiting pick-up, for the safety of staff and other students, any student with COVID-like symptoms will be isolated in the new weather-proof outdoor isolation zone, supervised by First Aid staff.

 Face Masks & Physical distancing: Face masks are highly recommended whenever indoors and whenever physical distancing is not possible.
 All students and staff are recommended to wear a face mask when indoors.

- Parents and carers conducting drop-off and pick-up who are unable to maintain social distance are recommended to wear a face covering.



- Students identified as household contacts: Students who are identified as Household contacts may continue to attend school under the following conditions:
 - A parent or guardian should register the student as a Household contact via the Marymede COVID Household Contacts notification form ; and
 - Year 3 12 students who are household contacts should wear a mask indoors at all times (also strongly advised for P-2); and

the student should undertake negative rapid tests (RATs) each school day over the seven days (from first exposure to the positive case); and
they must remain asymptomatic.

N.B. Students who have previously tested positive for COVID-19 will not be considered as a Household contact for 28 days after the end of their isolation period.

• Availability of Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs) for household contact and/or symptomatic testing: Families may collect a 5-pack of RAT home-tests (one pack per child) from Main Reception as needed. Secondary students may also collect a RAT kit from Main Reception after 3.15pm.

If your child receives a positive RAT test result at any time, a parent or guardian should register this result through the Department of Health system via COVID- 19 Positive Rapid Antigen Test Self-Reporting Form or 1800 675 398 (please also see the point above for informing the college via the Marymede COVID Notification Form).

We thank all parents and carers and students for your continuing patience, understanding and cooperation in assisting to keep our community safe.

Subject Changes

Students in Year 8-12 next year will receive their subject confirmation for 2023 by the end of this week. If students wish to change any of their subjects, they are required to source a subject change form from Mr Rovetto. This form must be signed by a parent and additional signatories as outlined on the form. Subject changes must be submitted and finalised prior to the conclusion of Term 1, Week 2.

Reports

The reports outline the progress of students across the range of learning areas and reflect on the knowledge and skills acquired throughout the semester. The Semester 2 reports will be published Thursday 8 December at 12.00pm via Parent Access Module . Should you have any questions about your child's report upon its receipt please don't hesitate to contact the relevant teacher.

VCE Holiday Homework

It is an expectation that all students completing VCE in 2023 complete holiday homework. Completion of this work is critical to setting students up for success and allows them to begin to familiar themselves with both the content and skills required to be demonstrated in the first outcome of the unit. During commencement classes over the coming fortnight the teacher will outline to students what they are required to complete and the deadline for this work. Students that do not submit their holiday homework by the due date will be issued with a detention.

2023 Testing Days

It is critical for teachers to have current data to know exactly where a student is at with their learning and what the next steps of learning growth are for them. Therefore, there is a testing day at the commencement of the 2023 school year (Wednesday 1 February) for all students in Year 1 - 6. This will enable us to analyse the data early in 2023 and we can target our teaching and learning programs to student's individual needs. The process for booking a testing spot will be communicated in the week beginning 16 January 2023 and will be made via PAM.

Gardening Club – Bush Tucker Garden

This past week has seen us take receipt of a large delivery of recycled mulch from Bulleen Art and Garden supplies. This mulch has been created by composting recycled roadside green waste. This has been purchased with a Junior Landcare Grant that we were gifted in 2020 to create the Bush Tucker Garden. We are busy moving mulch onto all areas of exposed soil in the Bush Tucker Garden.

The garden was planted in May 2021 and survived the 2021-2022 summer holidays without an additional drop (there were fewer than 5 days with rain during this time!). Our new Vegetable Garden

We are very pleased to announce that we have a space for our new vegetable garden! Stay tuned to watch this space slowly transform.

In September, as a part of their studies, the Year 10 VISTA students alongside their teacher, Richard Cosway, undertook a site analysis of the new area. They took into consideration the movement of the sun, areas of shade, access to water, aspect, and areas that may need a windbreak. From here, they created some basic landscaping layouts. Key ideas from these layouts have been brought together to create a concept plan, which will form the basis for our design.

As we are beginning to realise, creating a community garden is slow process that takes careful planning and preparation. This 'dream' has been in the pipeline since 2020. Consultations have been undertaken with a focus group of students and teachers to determine the fundamentals for the perfect Marymede Veggie Garden. Non-for-profit organisation 'Farm-raiser' (initiative of Kirsty Edwards, daughter of late staff member Mr Lindsay Cooper, may he rest in peace) kindly offered their advice in terms of preparing a garden from scratch.

It is an exciting project, that will create lots of opportunities for our student's moving forwards.

A big thanks to the group of enthusiastic Year 11 VCAL students who elected to contribute to the college community by working in the Bush Tucker Garden for the past four weeks. They have transformed the space with their efforts, weeding, creating new signs for our edible native plants, laying cardboard to supress weeds, mulching, and creating edging for the paths with rocks sourced onsite. Their hard work and enthusiasm has been greatly appreciated.



Plant in the spotlight

Common name: Kangaroo Apple. Botanical name: Solanum aviculare.

Indigenous name: Mookitch, Mayakitch. Gunditjmara language (far Western Victoria), meaning 'wild'

Location at Marymede: Bush Tucker Garden

Sometimes referred to as a Bush Tomato, this 3-4 metre open shrub produces bright orange fruit that are only to be eaten when very ripe and soft, otherwise are poisonous. Is thought to have been traditionally used on swollen joints and used as an effective anti-inflammatory. It produces a beautiful purple flower and is a terrific addition to the native garden. The use of the word kangaroo refers to the shape of the leaves, which resemble a Kangaroo's footprint.
