#### Winter uniform changeover period for Term 2

In recognition of COVID-related supply delays, there will be a two-week changeover period at the start of Term 2 where students may wear either winter or summer uniform.

By **Monday 9 May** all students are expected to be wearing full winter uniform.

## Victorian Premier's Spirit of ANZAC Prize: Congratulations to Savannah Shamon

The Premier's Spirit of Anzac Prize 2021 offered students in Year 9, 10 and 11 the opportunity to explore Australia's proud and significant war and peacekeeping history. Through the program, students were asked to express their perspectives and understanding of experiences of those who have served. This could be presented in a range of formats, including essay, artwork, video, audio, music, webpage or poem.

In 2021, students were asked to respond to the following prompt:

"The Spirit of Anzac is widely considered to represent the resilience of a nation and its peoples, through their courage, endurance, ingenuity, mateship, and good humour.

Explore this with respect to the experience and perspectives of Australians at war, service persons, individuals or community, in difficult times or times of conflict.

The experience you explore does not need to relate directly to Australian wartime, but should demonstrate a connection to, and your understanding of, the Spirit of Anzac."





As her VCE History teacher, I was very proud to be present when Savannah Shamon (Year 12, MacKillop 2) was recently awarded the 2021 Premier's Spirit of Anzac Prize at a ceremony at the Shrine of Remembrance. Savannah received a scholarship of \$2,500 from the government which can be used to support educational and co-curricular activities, equipment or materials.

Savannah's entry was an original song that she wrote and performed to honour the memory of the ANZACs. In a congratulatory letter, the Minister for Veterans, the Honourable Shaun Leane MP, commented that Savannah's song was of a very high standard and demonstrated her understanding of the service and sacrifice of our veterans.

## Welcome changes to COVID-Safe measures for Term 2

As we continue to learn to live with COVID-19, the following measures are in place for the start of Term 2 to ensure our College remains a safe environment for our students and staff:

 Parents & carers welcome on-campus for pick-up: parents & carers are welcome to enter the campus to meet your child for pickup. While parents / carers are also welcome to walk their child onto campus for morning drop-off, we ask that you please exit the campus once your child has deposited their

- bag at their safety line / locker. Please do not enter any buildings during either of these time.
- Reporting positive COVID results: Should any student receive a positive RAT or PCR result, a parent or guardian must report this result to the college via the Marymede COVID Notification Form.

The College will notify the school community through a daily email when a student or staff member has returned a positive COVID-19 result and had attended the college. This email will identify any classes affected and advise students to undertake a RAT and only return to school if they receive a negative result and are asymptomatic. Classes will generally not be sent home during the school day. Remote learning will only be considered as a localised, short-term, last-resort option.

- Students identified as household contacts:
   Students who are identified as Household contacts may continue to attend school under the following
  - o A parent or guardian must register the student as a Household contact via the Marymede COVID Household Contacts notification form.
  - o the student must wear a mask indoors at all times (Year 3 12); and
  - o the student must undertake at least five negative rapid tests over the seven days (from first exposure to the positive case); and
  - o they must remain asymptomatic.

conditions:

N.B. Students who have previously tested positive for COVID-19 will not be classified as a Household contact for 12 weeks after the end of their isolation period.

Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) 'surveillance' testing:
 For each 2-week period (up to at least 20 May),
 families will be supplied with a 5-pack of RAT home-tests (one pack per child) to be conducted on two school days each fortnight. These should be used on two school days in each week, regardless of whether or not your child shows any COVID symptoms or may have been in contact with a positive case.

If your child receives a positive RAT test result at any time, a parent or guardian must register this result through the Department of Health system via COVID-19 Positive Rapid Antigen Test Self-Reporting Form or 1800 675 398 (please also see the previous point for informing the college).

There is no requirement to report a negative result.

N.B. Students who have previously tested positive for COVID-19 do not need to undertake RAT surveillance testing for 12 weeks after the end of their isolation period.



- Students who are unwell must stay home: The
  most important action school communities can take
  to reduce the risk of transmission of coronavirus
  (COVID-19) is to ensure that any unwell staff and
  students remain at home and get tested, even with
  the mildest of symptoms (and even with a negative
  RAT or PCR result).
- No food-sharing: No food-sharing is permitted. This
  extends to a ban on home-made birthday treats:
  while we appreciate the need to mark milestones
  (particularly in the Primary years), this may only be
  done using pre-packaged foods.
- Face Masks & Physical distancing: While face masks are recommended whenever physical distancing is not possible, as per the latest directions of the Victorian Government, they are no longer mandatory in most situations:
  - o All students and staff are strongly encouraged to wear a face mask when indoors.
  - o Face masks must be worn by individuals over the age of 8 when on public transport and school buses – unless you have a lawful exemption.
  - o Parents and carers conducting drop-off and pick-up who are unable to maintain social distance should also wear a face covering
  - o Individuals over the age of 8 must carry a face mask at all times.



Proof of full vaccination to work with students:
 Where parents and visitors are granted permission to
 work with students in any capacity (either paid or
 voluntary), this is conditional on acceptable proof of
 being fully vaccinated.

We thank all parents and carers and students for your continuing patience, understanding and cooperation in assisting to keep our community safe, particularly our Primary students.

## DEPUTY PRINCIPAL LEARNING AND TEACHING PREP – YEAR 12

### NCCD: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data

Marymede Catholic College is committed to ensuring that all students enrolled in the College can access and participate in education. At times, reasonable adjustments are made to enable students to access and participate in education on the same basis as other students. In order to track student progress and set goals students may be placed on a Personalised Learning Plan (PLP)or Summary of Adjustments (SOA). The Summary of Adjustment page is a collaborative space where teachers document the strategies used to assist your son or daughter to access the curriculum. These are often in addition to the many ways teachers deliver lessons; they can be for your child only or several students within the class. The intention is to assist your child to achieve success.

Teachers will have spoken to any adjustments made during Parent Teacher interviews last term, where parents attended, and the full Summary of Adjustment document will be distributed to you later this term once teachers have monitored and reviewed the adjustments.

## RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS

#### **Attendance**

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

After two years disrupted by COVID and Home Learning we were grateful to have an entire term of on campus learning so far this year and we are hopeful and optimistic that this will continue for the remainder of the year.

For some students and families, we acknowledge that consistent school attendance may be challenging and so we encourage parents and guardians to contact the school if you need any support with ensuring your child(ren) attend school each day. We are keen to work together with families to ensure all our students maintain the highest possible levels of attendance at school.

High levels of attendance will ensure that your child maintains a strong connection with their teachers, school friends and the Marymede community and this in turn may support them in overcoming any anxiety they may feel about coming to school.

Coming to school every day is vital, but if for any reason your child must miss school (such as symptomatic illness), there are things we can do together to ensure they stay connected and up to date:

- Speak with your child's teacher(s) to find out if there are any learning activities your child has missed that may be completed at home.
- Older students can communicate with their teachers to find out what learning has been missed.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your child's teacher as early as possible.

Please discuss any concerns you have with your child's pastoral teacher so we can work together to get your child to school every day.

If your child is refusing to attend school, please ensure that the College is aware so that we can support your child and family with overcoming this pattern of behaviour.

#### The Start of the School Day & Late Arrivals

School commences each day at 8.45am. All students are expected to arrive at school and be in their safety line or Pastoral Group prior to this time.

Students who arrive after 8.45am need to enter via Main Reception and sign in to obtain a late pass. Parents of students in Prep to Year 3 who are arriving late, are asked to accompany their child(ren) to Main Reception to sign them in.

#### **Absentee Communication**

There are times when we will need to contact you, including on the day if your child is absent and you haven't informed the school as to why. Do we have your most up-to-date contact details? If not, please contact the school on 9407 9000 so we can update our records. Please include parent/carer's name, address, phone numbers, email address and emergency contact details. Please remember to contact the school if any of these details or your circumstances change.

Protecting the safety and well-being of children through the reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/carers and schools.

Please remember to call the school on 9407 9000 or email at absentees@marymede.vic.edu.au or log your child's absence using our Parent Access Module (PAM) early in the morning if your child is going to be away or late for school so your child's absence can be recorded correctly.

Our school will text you as soon as practicable on the day if a student is not at school and you haven't notified the school as to why. If you are notified by the school that your child is away without a reason, please contact us as soon as possible by calling 9407 9000 or email at absentees@marymede.vic.edu.au to let us know where your child is. If we cannot reach you because we don't have your correct contact details (i.e. message notification fail, disconnected number), then we will

make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school on the same day of the unexplained absence (where possible).

Please remember it is a parental / guardian responsibility to contact the College to provide an explanation for your child's absence from school; whenever possible, please inform us in advance of upcoming absences.
